SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS

The opening days of the different fishing seasons were announced by the Dept. of Lands and Forests a few weeks ago. In leaving through the opening dates we still find those ever present dates that never change come Monday to Sunday.

For example, Black Bass opens Wednesday, May 15th, Muskogee opens Thurs., June 20 and Wed., May 15th, Speckled and Brown trout opens Wed., May 1st and a few more that opens on Tuesdays and Fridays.

The closing dates are a little mixed up also. Here is a break down on the openings and closings of the fishing seasons in Ont. Openings on Tuesdays, there are 2; Wed there are 15; Thurs, there are 11; Fri, there are 4; Sat, there are 10.

Closings on Sun, there are 12; Tues, there are 6; Thurs, there are 1; Sat, there are 13.

There are 3 openings contained in long weekends and 3 closings contained in long weekends.

If it is the opinion of many fishermen and yours truly that with a little more thought by the Dept., the fishing seasons could no doubt be opened on Saturdays, and closed Sundays. Then with just a little more thought it could be arranged where holidays were involved, that the openings could be advanced 1 week and the closings delayed 1 week.

It would give the camp and lodge owner's business a shot up the arm and in turn boosting our tourist industry. Even on a trial basis it would prove to some that here in Ontario progress is our most important pastime.

Reports from the Lake Simcoe district office show some 95 vehicles were involved in collisions with deer, 51 of which gave an estimated total damage of \$7,725 or approximately \$151 per vehicle.
