

To most of us old timers who think that today's teenager spends time G.W. (that is girl watching to squares) there came an enlightening story this week from Cranbury, New Jersey. The local Lions Club sponsored a program, for several high school students to instill them with the competitive spirit incumbant, with big business. The Lions ran the project as a contest, the response from the young sters in the area then became overwhemingly enthusiastic. The boys got their introduct tion to the business world because they had at their disposal Lions from all areas of business who they consulted on management problems.

The teenagers were called on to make decisions regarding the price at which to sell products, of a large paper company, and how much to invest in marketing, research, and plant improvements, the information was then fed into an IBM 721 computer to determine the company's income and profit. Anticipating the computers' verdict as eagerly as the boys were the Lions, who helped the youngsters chart the progress of each company of large graphs.

The Cranbury Lions, who believe in developing teen potentialities to the fullest, planned the project with educational goals in mind. Not only did the youngsters quire new knowledge but they gamed valuable insights into potential careers.

Capital for the project was primarily time, income was in terms of personal satisfaction. The Lions knew for certain the program was a success when they learned the boys were missing football games to discuss profit margins and losses, instead of field goals and passes. This human vignette reminds me of the immortal words of James Oliver when he said.

The world is blessed most by men who do things and not by those who merely talk about them."
