### Sniping is No Good Ratepayer Complains

A Maple Ave. resident, Jim McCaig, complained to council Monday about constant sniping at last year's council as reported in the town press. "I've followed council reports for years and this is the first council that has continually discredited their predecessors," he said. "Surely you are men enough and capable of conducting business without laying the blame on someone else. Every council must take over unfinished business, be ready to start with a clean slate. A deficit of \$44,000 has been quoted for last year, but he wondered if adjustments might not reduce this as happened in 1961 when a large apparent deficit of \$43,000 was considerably reduced. "The mayor asked in a radio speech that we encourage industry to locate here. Do you think this will happen if this discrediting keeps up?" he asked.

Mayor Hyde said he appreciated Mr. McCaig's concern but pointed out that council usually finish projects started by themselves like building bridges, buying land and subsidizing applications. "I admit there has been a hiccup and I said a couple of weeks ago this would be the end of it," said the mayor. "But since then letters in the press have contradicted statements and now you yourself are bringing this into prominence again."

The mayor said the town had an actual deficit of \$8,000 in 1961 and repeated a prior opinion that 1962 will have the largest deficit ever created in one year.

And 1960 ended without a cent in the red," he added. "He said last week council paid for lands that should have been acquired in 1962 and that many similar things are going on. And that evening correspondence would reveal no permission to build bridges and culverts already built last fall.
