Years ago hunting could be done, with little worry of hittings cows, sheep, pigs and barns. Now, hunting creates many problems, but these problem are not without solutions.

All that is needed are some men, to sit together with open minds, and weigh each problem on its own merit It has been said, that cars kill more people and do more

property damage than any other man-made invention, when used as part of our every day way of life. If by-laws were passed, that prohibited cars from being driven through certain townships and counties, what a sorry mess we would be in.

I was informed by a conservation officer, who will remain and the Brampton YPS had a unnamed, that it is a fact the Dept. of Lands and Forests could over-rule all such bylaws prohibiting hunting in townships and counties, but frown on doing so, for political reasons -- they hope that this problem can be settled by other means, and they no doubt could, if given the chance
