**Raiders Extend Their Season Thump Sailors, Make Playoffs**

An explosive four goal second period, three of them by the league scoring leader Moe Galand, boosted Raiders to an 8-3 win over Port Colborne Sailors in a dramatic finish to the COHL schedule here Friday night. Both teams were battling for their hockey lives, and the fourth and last playoff position.

Raiders and Sailors were tangled in a 2-2 tie at the end of the first period but the Georgetown scoring spurt wasn't a complete surprise to the 700 fans who watched the contest. The Raiders were skating and passing with authority in the first period and much the better of the play although held to two goals. Port Colborne failed to reply to any of the Georgetown second period goals and fell farther behind in a rough third period when they were outscored 2 goals to 1.

"Though they can't do anything now to alter the standings the Raiders could finish as high as third if Dundas Grats lose their remaining games.

Consequently their opposition in the first round of the league playoffs could be either the first place Oakville Oaks or second place Welland Merchants. In either case Raiders would be the underdogs. In six games with Oakville Oaks this year Georgetown won the first three, by 2-0, 5-4, and 4-2 scores, and lost the next three 10-6, 5-2 and 7-1. Against Welland they fared much worse, winning only one of six, but that a 1-24 thumping Welland was the victor in each of their other meetings, 10-4; 11-3; 5-1; 6-2; and 8-6.

If Raiders play the Grade A hockey they showed Friday night when the playoffs start past records won't mean beans.
