Alexander D. Hume, son of the late George and Elizabeth Hume, died in Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital on Monday, February 18th in his 85th year. He was born on Lot 12, 6th Line East of Georgetown, August 18th, 1878. He farmed at Lot 8 on the 6th Line for about ten years and then moved to the home farm on the 8th Line in the fall of 1913. In 1927 he retired from farming and moved to Georgetown. Shortly after he took over the Massey Harris Agency. When he sold the Agency about 20 years later he continued to work with the business, owners for another eight or ten years.
