Explains Plant Growth Under Artificial Light

Growing plants under artificial light received the attention of members of the Georgetown Horticultural Society at their February public meeting last Wednesday evening in Howard Wrigglesworth School. H. J. Herder, as chairman, introduced the guest speaker, R. J. Bolton of Sylvania Electric Ltd., whose firm has plants on the market the Gro-Lux lamp. This lamp represents the present stage in attempts to develop a type of light which can meet the light requirements for normal plant growth much better than that of the common incandescent lamp, though falling short of the ideal lighting of sunlight. This type of light is obtained by coating the inside of the glass tube with a material that causes the lamp to emit light with more of the blue and red but less of the yellow and green bands as found in the visible part of the spectrum. This enables plants to be grown normally even under artificial conditions indoors. Although different kinds of plants have different light intensity requirements, this can be arranged by altering the distance of the lamp from the plants. A. E. Taylor thanked the speaker for his interesting talk. The chairman announced the personnel of various committees set up by the Board in carry out projects during the year. Special mention was made of a library project and plans to increase membership. A door prize draw resulted in lucky wins for Mrs. H. Scott, Neil Benton, J. L. Colter and Mrs. Alex Dobson. Refreshments were served at the close of the meeting by the Social Committee.

Ice Capades Booked For Kitchener Week

ICE CAPADES! — the 22nd edition — spells out a superlative success story for all concerned in the spectacular ice show's influential sphere. For John H. Harris, the idealistic mentor of Ice Capades, the last 22 years of dazzling entertainment have been most gratifying. His Ice Capades reached a pinnacle in its history two years ago when the U.S. State Dept. sent them to Moscow on a cultural exchange visit. Skating with Ice Capades are two Canadians, a brother and sister pair — Otto and Maria Jelinek from Bronte. They captured the World Pairs Skating Championships in Prague last winter before 18,000 live fans and another 125 million more European TV viewers. Prague was the city of their birth, from which as children, they had fled Communist persecution. Thusly the Jelineks turned flight into victory. This is the 12th season that an Ice extravaganza has appeared in the Kitchener Memorial Auditorium. All indications point to a record attendance of over 50,000 bewitched Ice Capades fans. There is still an opportunity to purchase tickets for any one of the 8 performances starting Tuesday, March 5th through Sunday, March 10th. Orders should be sent immediately to ensure seats.

H.S. Board Briefs

The resignation of Dick Prust from the Advisory Vocational Committee was accepted with regret by the D.H.S. Monday night. To fill the vacancy thus created, James McCaug was appointed to the Committee. The possibility of filling in and using the land behind the new post office as a playing field is being investigated. Then, it is hoped, any extension of the school would be built on part of the present playing field. That school costs are high was borne out again by a total of \$131,614.52 for February accounts passed by the Board. Salaries alone totalled \$22,272. In addition supply teachers salaries amounted to \$184.95. Supply teachers for the H.S. School receive \$23 per day or \$24.50 per day with over two years experience. Building accounts of \$109,712.06 and general accounts of \$8,630 made up the remainder. Attendance officer W. H. Moyer reported more cases of "skipping" this month than previously. In most cases both parents were working and unaware of the students' absence. He called at thirteen homes during the month and enlisted the full co-operation of the parents. Excellent reports of the progress of four local students attending the Central Technical School, Toronto, were received by the Board. They are Gerry De Rose, Penny Burlew, Wayne Terry and David Smith. When Milton introduces limited technical programmes, graduates of the Grade 10 technical course in Milton High School will be allowed to attend Georgetown High School. Let the Grade 11 and 12 specialized Shop Courses. Milton will only offer the technical course as far as Grade 10.

Squelch Rumour Prince at Lorne Scot Function

Lt. Col. E. F. Conover, C.O. of the Lorne Scots squelched the rumour that HRH Prince Philip would present the Regal Medal colours next fall. "I can't tell you who it is yet," he told county council last week, "but it is definitely not Prince Philip." In appearing before Halton County Council to ask for a grant of \$5,000 for the year, the commanding officer disclosed that the complete cost of the presentation of colours ceremony, which will take place at Caledon in October, will be \$13,785. \$1,000 of this is earmarked accommodation and travelling expenses of a person to present colours. Over thirty years ago in 1931 was the last presentation of colours. This was to the old Peel and Dufferin Regiment by Lord Wellington. Peel County has been asked for the same grant as Halton County to help defray the total budget of \$17,900, for the 469 man unit.

Proposes Distinct Orange For Margarine Colouring

The president of the Hamilton Milk Marketing Board, and vice president of the Regional Milk Producers, Laverne Diamond, advocated a little softer line towards the proponents of colored margarine by milk producers Association in Glenora Field Officer Glen Williams United Church Monday. Mr. Diamond, introduced by the association's retiring president, Calvin McIntyre, said that a private members' bill has been presented at Queen's Park which would allow margarine to be coloured. He said maybe the manufacturers should be allowed to colour, but some colour other than that of butter. He suggested a distinct orange. Mr. Diamond covered a range of problems facing the producers and placed near the head of the list the increased sales of 2 per cent milk which means he was introduced by the processing and storing of more butter. He said subsidizing and recent reduction of 'butter' prices has helped the 'butter' somewhat but did not present an absolute panacea. "The government is willing to assist the producers if the producers show signs of helping themselves," he concluded. "We produce the milk, but we will have to cooperate with the distributors if these problems are to be solved." An audience of 65, supplied to the two Georgetown dairies, their wives and guests heard Mr. Diamond's address and brief words from other members of the head table. Georgetown Man Seeks Nomination for NDP

A Georgetown man, Cameron Millard, has announced his candidacy for the New Democratic Party nomination. The convention will be held tonight in Oakville. Mr. Millard, 38, a senior design draftsman for P. Graham Bell Associates Ltd. told The Herald this week that he would seek to represent the riding for the New Democrats in the April 8th federal election. A 41 year old Oakville high school teacher, Ellis Fullerton is also seeking the nomination. Mr. Millard is the son of a former labour leader Cameron H. Millard who twice represented the riding of York Harbour in the Ontario legislature as a CCF member. Though this is his first attempt at contesting a political office, Mr. Millard has always been keenly interested in politics and has been actively involved since his early teens. He has consistently supported the CCF. Born in Oshawa, where his father was a General Motors employee, Mr. Millard spent his early years there and moved to Toronto in 1939 where he finished his schooling. He entered the armed service in 1942 and served overseas. After his discharge in 1945 he attended and graduated from the Veterans Re-Hab Institute in Toronto and later worked as a junior draftsman there. He was in training for four years in Northern Ontario and Northern Saskatchewan, and later returned to design drafting in the employ of the Alberta Government. He lived in Edmonton for several years and there married a registered nurse who had also served overseas with the Air Force. He returned to Ontario in 1958 farming sixty acres near London and continuing as a senior draftsman. He moved to Georgetown recently and plans to buy or build a house and become a permanent resident here.
