Best Boosts Nuclear Weapons For Canada

Sandy Best, Halton's Federal Conservative Candidate, and former Member of Parliament, stated this week that in his opinion, Canada should acquire defensive nuclear weapons for her forces at home and in Europe.

Dr. Best said the Government's decision on nuclear arms has been partly dependent on the progress of the disarmament negotiations at Geneva, and that the deadlock and probable disintegration of these discussions is now evident.

"The manned bomber threat to North America may continue throughout this decade," said Dr. Best. "The problems of specific military hardware are, naturally, subject to constant change, but the principle of the use of defensive nuclear weapons by Canadian forces, in a variety of ways, should now be settled. The immediate availability of nuclear weapons at points of use would appear essential," he declared.

Was Employed as Cook At Stan's Restaurant

After an illness of two months Theresa (Christ) Vickers died in Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital at the age of fifty two. Mrs. Vickers who was born in England, came to Canada in 1933 to live in Toronto. In 1943 she moved to Orangeville and later to Burks Falls in 1949 where she resided for two years before coming to Terra Cotta. In 1955 she moved to Georgetown where she lived until moving back to Terra Cotta last year. Mrs. Vickers had been employed as a cook at the Corner Cupboard, now Stan's Restaurant and was captain of Stan's team in the Ladies Dart Club. She is survived by two children, John Kenyon of Ottawa and Mrs. G. Barr (Pat) of Oranmotto, New Brunswick, and five grandchildren. Also left in England are a sister and two brothers. One brother predeceased her.

Anglican Ladies Hear South African Bishop

Several ladies of St. George's Anglican Church journeyed to St. Paul's Church, Westdale, to attend the monthly board meeting of the Diocesan W.A. Over 200 women warmly welcomed the guest speaker the Rt. Rev. Alphaeus H. Zulu Bishop Zulu is the only Anglican bishop in south Africa, and is paying a brief visit to Hamilton to tell of the work his church is doing and needs to do. He is a member of the Zulu Royal family, and has 7 children.

Bishop Zulu, whose parents were converted by English missionaries, went to mission school and then became a teacher for 12 years before being trained for the ministry. He spent 20 years as a priest, and has been assistant bishop since 1960. In St. John's Diocese, which has a scattered population of 1,500,000 of whom 22,000 are white; there are 900 churches, and 98 clergy. Of the African community one quarter are Christian and 100,000 of these are Anglican. Much of the work in the church has to be done by laymen.

"The great need is the work of instructing people in the Christian faith," said Bishop Zulu. "We propose to do this by training more adequately our lay evangelists who carry so much of the burden of the work. We arrange ten day courses for them in groups throughout the region and send others to a catechist school in Zululand to receive more intensive training, so that some of them can be employed full time as catechists."

"Their work consists of conducting services, and being in charge of churches, converting non-Christians and preparing candidates for baptism and confirmation. The people are very poor, there is no industry, farming is on the subsistence level, and people must go to Johannesburg, or Durban the nearest centre, is 280 miles away. The men are not allowed to take their families with them, and one of the needs is for women to help to train the African women and girls in handicrafts and cottage industries. THERE IS NO SHORTAGE of volunteers for Christian work among the African," said the Bishop. The greatest need is money to train these people properly. "It costs \$300 to train an evangelist, and \$360 a year, to employ him full time. It costs \$1,500, over three years to train a priest. If we are given help in training we can save money to do other church work."

The offering taken at the meeting was \$200 and another \$100 was voted by the W.A. members.
