



Don't Fool with Groulx His Goal Kills Raiders

If Raider coach Scotty Patterson had to sum up his club's initial game in the 1963 group playoffs in one word he'd probably say: Groulx - ing

The Merchants had little trouble in pumping home five more unanswered markers before the buzzer put an end to it.

A low, hard slap shot by Early at 10:04 snapped the deadlock, and after that Welland was never headed. Groulx passed to Miller moments later and Cameron blocked the drive, but Robertson was in the right spot for the rebound and he punched it into the bottom left corner to make it 3-1. Bob Demerse raked in a Junior Beaumont pass and partially fanned on his shot from close in but got enough of the puck to trickle it under the Welland netminder for Raider's second and final goal. A two-on-one break yielded Welland's fourth goal. Ewer and Desson were the attacking pair that fooled the lone Raider rearguard and Desson carried on to score.

Groulx's quick third period stinger was just one of five points he contributed to the Welland cause. Desson, from Eric Unger and Macoretta, a long shot from just over the blue line, made it 5-2 and Groulx took an encore at 8:40 by whacking it under Cameron's stick. Miller had failed on another good scoring chance. Early finished off a three-on-one break with Welland's eighth score at 12:06. It stayed 8-2 until, with little more than two minutes remaining, Miller finally cashed in from Balkwell and Robertson. A minute and thirty seconds showed on the clock when Early ran it to double figures from Desson and Groulx.

Raiders managed only three shots on the Welland net in the first period 10 times it was closer in the middle period, 18 to 12. The shot keeper threw away his pad and pencil in the third.

Being the perfect hosts on Sunday, March 3rd, Georgetown Tykes dropped one to Delhi by a 2-1 score. This is the best game so far this season. Both teams were quite evenly matched and it was a real thriller to watch. A return game is being arranged and it is hoped we have a following to Delhi like they brought with them.
