Early Budget Saves Money

That council has expended a great amount of time and thought on the 1963 budget was seen last week when ratepayers learned that there will be only a conservative ise in their tax payments this year.

A residential increase of 2.28 mills: was the final decision, after conferring with elected and appointed boards which did some budget paring along with councillors.

It is not easy, as anyone in business these days will know, to hold costs at their last year level. We are still in an inflationary spiral which started during the war years and has continued now for twenty-odd years. But there is indication that the spiral

is levelling off to some extent and it is a wise move for a municipal council to do its , best to hold costs within previous figures.

Especially noteworthy is the early budget date which, in itself, will cut borrowing costs and help to keep the texerate down. Finance chairman John Ellion and his

committee deserve the thanks of ratepayers, for promoting an early budget which can set a pattern for future years. Tax money will now become available much earlier, than has been the custom, and bank borrowing will only be necessary for the first three or four months until payments due on April 8th begin to reach the town treasury.

Rodeo Project Too Risky

What was hoped to be a yearly event which would build on a smaller scale to the famous Calgary Stampede, has been dropped by the Lions Club.

"Too risky" was the club decision last week when its third annual Rodeo came up for discussion.

"Too bad," we say, for the rodeo was a catchy attraction locally and one which residents were beginning to look forward to

But no one can disagree with the Lions who found that weeks of work and worry produced only \$300 in net profit last year, and less the year before.

The club is interested in making a

reasonable profit on its projects, and \$300 is only a pittance measured in the work involved. And even this cannot be assured, with a one-day event completely dependent on the weather.

Perhaps the Lions can come up in future with another event which could fill the double purpose of raising funds for public service work and putting Georgetown in the national news.

Fergus has its highland games, Calgary its stampede, Toronto its CNE, Shelburne its old tyme fiddling. There must be something that can be Georgetown's if we all put our heads together.

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
