Expense Tabs May Be Racket

Byril Clark Warns Councillors

Chinguacousy councillors' expense accounts could turn into a "racket," Reeve Cyril Clark angrily charged at last week's meeting. "I'm not going to sit here and let such a thing happen," he declared.

The flare-up came when four Council members submitted their expense accounts for a 3-day good roads committee convention in Toronto. Expenses included parking charges, meals, mileage to and from Toronto and a registration fee of \$3.

"I didn't spend \$3 for any registration fee," said Reeve Clark. "All you get is a ticket to stick on your coat so people will know who you are. It's just another racket of the good roads committee," he declared.

Mr. Clark said he would do

his best to cut out high expense account spending by councillors. "We have to have a set limit on all expenses," he said.

Chinguacousy councillors are paid an annual salary and are not entitled to a daily rate for attending conventions. Mileage, meals, transportation and other expenses may be charged to the township.

In declaring he was going to put an end to unusually high expense tabs, Reeve Clark said, "Nothing will get you into more trouble than a racket."

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Urge Family Plan For Fire Escape

Do you and your family have a pre-arranged plan for escaping from your home in the event of fire? If you awoke tonight to find your house on fire, how would you get out safely?

To help you make such a plan, the Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau, in co-operation with the Ontario Safety League, has recently issued a pamphlet outlining the basic steps to be taken in setting up a fire escape plan for your home. It is called "Plan Your Escape."

This pamphlet will be widely distributed through Halton County. Copies of the pamphlet can be obtained by writing, or calling your local fire department. Your whole family's lives may depend on whether or not you have such an escape plan.

Although planning a fire-escape route to use in the event of a fire is of prime importance, it is equally important to take steps to prevent fires from starting.

Piles of rubbish near the furnace, faulty wiring, frayed electrical cords, faulty heating equipment, improperly stored inflammables, smoking in bed, untidy housekeeping, matches within the reach of children — all give fire a place to start.

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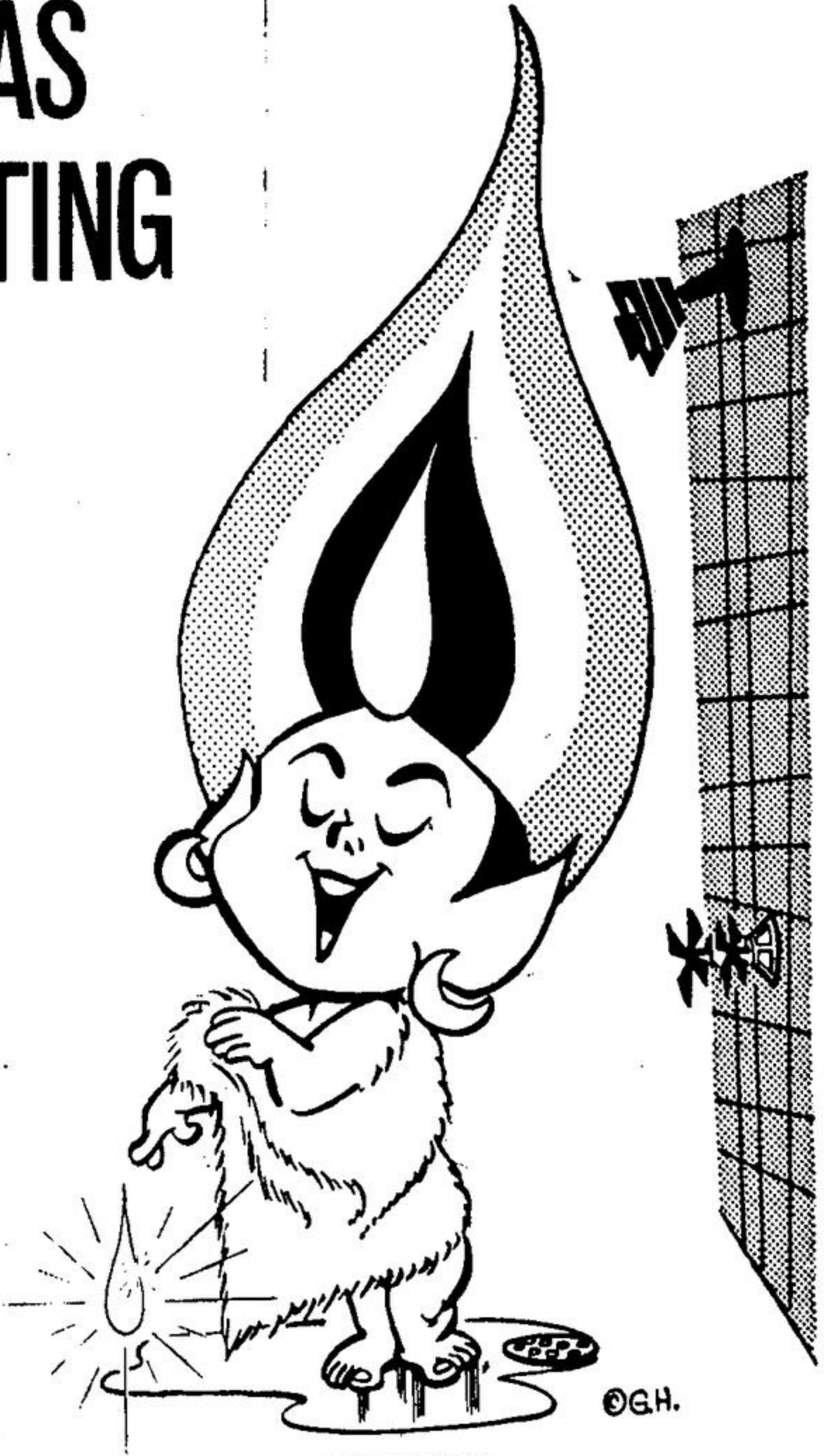
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
