Plaza Merchants Seek Extra Garbage Pick-Up

Although the garbage collection contract calls for only one weekly pick-up, downtown merchants have been getting twice weekly service as a goodwill gesture by the contractor.

Now merchants in Deirex Market Centre are asking for the same service. Cr. Jim Young told council on Monday, Cr. Bill Smith said he has also had such requests.

Public works chairman Charles Hildebrandt said the extra downtown pick-up was only a favour by the contractor and is being done because there are limited facilities for garbage storage, whereas the market centre has better provision for storage.

Mayor Hyde said that if twice weekly service is extended, neighbourhood stores would also be entitled to it.

"I'd like to see everyone treated fairly," said Reeve Elliott. "Perhaps this good will could be extended to the plaza too."

Cr. Smith said this could be a little thing in town unity and he would also like to see a solution.

Council decided to discuss it at a committee meeting to see what can be done.

Must Increase Pumping Capacity At Waterworks

Urgency in increasing pumping capacity of the town's deep well water system caused council Monday to order an engineering report from the Proctor and Redfern firm of consultants.

Since water from Silvercreek reservoir was cut off from the system, Mayor Hyde said, pumping has increased by 25%.

"It would thus appear that a quarter of our supply was coming from this contaminated source," he said, "and entering water mains in the north end of town."

The engineering report, water chairman Don Powers told council, will also include advice on installation of automatic pumping and elevated storage.

Payment is to be on a per diem basis, not to exceed a total cost of \$1,000.

Adopt Purchase Orders For Budget Control

Tighter budget control by use of purchase orders for all town buying and a requirement that accounts be submitted within 30 days of delivery of goods was endorsed Monday by the council.

Meanwhile Mayor Hyde instructed committee chairman to check all accounts passed this year, segregating those which applied to 1962 business with the idea that these should be grouped as a supplementary deficit in this year's budget.

Earlier several accounts being passed that evening had been noted as applying to last year, including those for police uniforms, a number of garage repair accounts, light bulbs for ornamental street lighting and purchase of a sand spreader which Deputy Reeve Hunter said would not be substituted because tenders had not been called for the purchase. The town, however, will receive rental subsidy on this.

Reeve Elliott suggested that purchase orders have prior sanction of committee chairmen, and Cr. Smith recommended committee chairmen getting copies of purchase orders affecting their departments.

Junior Bowlers Out of New Guelph Man Takes Competition by 26 Pins Beat The Champ Crown

Georgetown Junior girls team was crowned last Sunday at Georgetown and District Junior Girls' Team semi-finals by Art Davis. Stan hails 26 pins. With twelve teams competing the Georgetown girls stood third after the final count was taken with a three-game score of 2716. Shed Destroyed, But Firemen Save House

Faulty wiring has been blamed for a fire which completely destroyed a storage shed on a Norval home late Sunday night.

The tenant, Howard Miller, said following the blaze that a switch in the shed had jolted him a couple of times when he went to turn the light on, and had given him a shock less than an hour before the fire.

Mr. Miller told Fire Chief Bob Bonfield that he and his wife were watching television when they heard a noise at least half an hour before the fire was discovered. He said he looked in the downstairs rooms and later made a quick inspection of the upstairs but found nothing that could have caused it.

At about 10 minutes past 10 o'clock the kitchen door was blown in by the intense heat and gases which had built up in the back shed from the un noticed flames. Mr. and Mrs. Miller fled the house with their 221 baby immediately, but Mr. Miller returned to rescue his dog and do what he could to check the blaze.

Firemen poured water on the rear wall to keep the fire from spreading into the house. Some damage was done to the roof but the three room shed, which was used for storage space, was beyond saving.

The last fire truck left the scene at 25 minutes to 12.
