WHAT COUNCIL DID

Council Seeks Cut in School Board Budget

Council's finance committee will meet with the public school board in an effort to cut the board's budget by \$6,000.

On Monday council learned that the board has set \$318,677 as its requisition from 1963 taxes. Council had estimated only \$313,105 in setting the mill rate last week.

Mayor Hyde said that provincial sales tax money is mainly used for reducing local education costs and this year government subsidy is up another \$5,000 per student.

"This means \$10,000 extra from the province," he said, "and I would appreciate the board reviewing its budget in an effort to keep to our estimate."
