"I prefer to work while he walks!"

Hale and hearty at 37, this is the reaction of Harry Harley, MD, to a public challenge by Sandy Best, PC candidate for Halton in the forthcoming federal election, to walk 50 miles around the riding with him.

"I am sure the constituents of Halton County are more interested in how I would deal with the serious issues in Canada, rather than spend many hours, even days, hiking around the riding, just for the sake of hiking," he declared.

"I prefer my exercise, as has been my custom for the last several months, walking between my office in the West Block of the Parliament Buildings and the House of Commons; and between there and my apartment."

Halton's Liberal candidate, seeking re-election to Parliament, termed the challenge a publicity stunt.

"The evidence to prove this is that the Tory candidate sent all the challenges to the newspaper and failed to send one to the person he was challenging," he said.

Dr. Harley was unable to see the connection between "his frivolous challenge" and "the serious issues facing Canada today."

"This is just another example of Conservative inability to face the real issues of the day and to make the decisions necessary for the good of all Canadians," he concluded.
