It will be Oakville and Norval in the Georgetown Industrial League finals which get underway Sunday at the Memorial Arena.

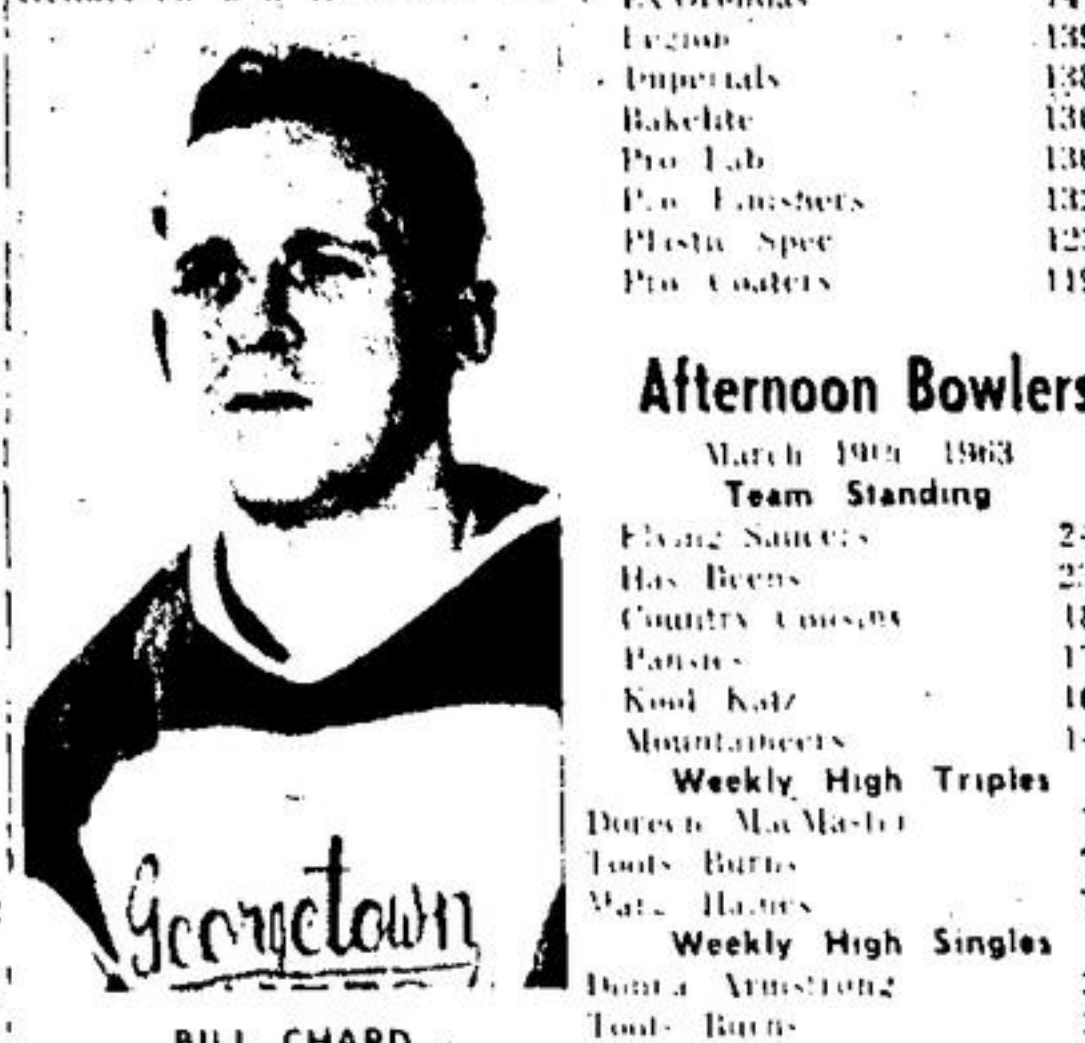
