Confident of Victory | **Burial at Southampton**
Says P-C Chairman | **For Mrs. W. Donaldson**

Last weekend saw meetings held by the local P-C group in their Main Street headquarters, over Superior Stores in the old Henry Davis offices. As well as having meetings of the area chairmen and poll workers, a larger meeting was held of all interested in working for the PC party.

Tom Sale, of Oakville, campaign chairman, spoke briefly, outlining how each and every one could help. He emphasized the example of Oakville, where the organization is at ready confidently looking forward to victory.

Henry Best, his brother, campaign manager, then spoke briefly, and outlined methods used in other ridings. He made a stirring appeal to everyone to get out and put Sandy Best back where he belongs, in the House of Commons.

Sandy Best then spoke and thanked all for their continued support. He said with just a little push they would make it this time, and urged all to add him.

Sandy, in his speech, dealt with the aspects of the campaign, and said that he would like to refute the ridiculous claim that the Liberals are making that they will have a Liberal government after April 8. He asked where the Grits are going to get the seats to form a government. "Certainly not in the Maritimes," that's evident by the consistent absence of enthusiasm in the Pearson campaign. The Liberals are going to lose in Quebec, and have no chance of gaining in the West. And with the gimmicks such as their 'truth squad,' colouring books, and other methods, they're not making any headway in Ontario. Contrast this with the tremendous ovation given Mr. Diefenbaker everywhere," Mr. Best concluded.

Area chairman N. McDonald, E. Arnold and B. Lantz also reported on their organization in their areas, and a number of new workers were welcomed, including Mr. W. Kent, a former campaign manager for Jim McGrath, P-C member in Newfound.

President Les Clark closed the meeting by reminding all of the joint meeting Monday evening, March 25th, at Wrigleyworth School where all candidates are speaking. He also told the group that they could now get information from 9:00 a.m. on by phoning 877-9900, the committee room phone, which will be manned by volunteers.

There will be someone in the rooms to answer questions, afternoons and evenings from now until election day, the speaker said.

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Part Open, Part Closed**Decides Industrial Group**

Georgetown Industrial Commission meetings will be part, public, part closed in future. On a showing of hands at a commission meeting last Thursday, commission members voted to hold half of their meetings behind closed doors so that they could "talk freely without giving away clues that might be picked up by other towns seeking industries."

Industrial commission chairman William Hunter expressed concern over a press reporter who turned up at the meeting and his opinion that a newspaper report could leak guarded information to the new policy. He told his fellow commissioners that he would resign if the entire meetings were going to be open to the press. He said the press had not made a habit of attending the sessions and do not attend the Industrial Commission meetings in other towns.

During the business the commission:

• Filed a letter asking the commission to subscribe to the Thomas Register 1963 Edition at a price of forty dollars.

• Answered a letter from The Canada Trust Company requesting a list of industrial manufacturers in this area.

• Agreed to acknowledge industrial leads from two Georgetown residents who passed on tips to Mayor E. Hyde and . Commission Chairman Hunter, by thanking them in a letter and informing them how their information is being followed up.

• Asked the secretary to set up two-man visitation teams to represent the commission at meetings with potential industry. The names of William Hunter and Bob Lane, Mayor Hyde and Dave Capperdale, John Elliott and Ron Little, and Jim Young and Murray Henley were accepted as well as Walter Gray who will fill in whenever one of a pair is unavailable.
