Angered at Press, Would Resign Industry Chairman

Because of an argument about barring the press from meetings of the industrial Commission, Deputy Reeve Wm. F. Hunter, told council Monday he will resign from the commission to which he was elected chairman a month ago.
Mr. Hunter cited a report in a Toronto newspaper telling about a meeting last week which claimed Globe & Mail reporter Joan Stalker was "ordered out of the meeting."
"I never even spoke to her following the commission's decision to close the meeting," he said. "And I think the report was little on the slanderous side."
Mr. Hunter explained his stand that most business discussed by the commission is confidential and cannot be discussed with reporters in attendance.
"When the motion was carried to have the balance of our meeting closed, the reporter left the room," he said. "She was never ordered out."
The deputy said no reporters had appeared at meetings since 1961 and 1962 and wondered why this had started this year.
"I brought Standard Products to town in 1959 and helped to bring American Marietta's last year," he said. "But I am wondering if there are people opposed to me being chairman this year, so I'm asking to be removed from the commission."
He added that he will still do his best to bring more industry to town.
"You do many things in this job that you don't get paid for," he said, citing taking a couple of prospects to dinner last week. "Maybe people would rather have the mill rate raised and hire an industrial commissioner. I feel quite a few people aren't with me so I am quitting."
Mayor Hyde said Mr. Hunter had been named chairman by the commission and his resignation should go to that body if he wished to make it.
"It isn't council's business to rule on how industrial meetings should be conducted," said the mayor. "I've done the same thing in council, adjourning a meeting and then staying for a committee meeting and the press has left the room as expected of them."
At this point, council's motion in adjourn was presented. Reeve Elliott asked to speak on the previous matter, but Mayor Hyde ruled him out of order. The adjournment motion carried 5-3, with the reeve, deputy and Cr Powers voting against it.
