Jim Walde of Milton was elected president of the Ontario Baseball Assn. at the OBA annual meeting in Niagara Falls last week. Mr. Walde has been active in baseball for the past 14 years and is presently second vice president of the Halton County Baseball Assn.

Last year, the OBA's first vice president, Mr. Walde replaces Jack Carson of Belleville as president.

He was named by a majority ballot of 50 voting delegates in a three-way race for the executive position. In accepting the position, Mr. Walde stated that "I hope I can do as good a job as Jack Carson, whom I consider one of the finest presidents the OBA ever had."
