**Consider Free Phoning
Georgetown, Brampton**

Free telephone service between Acton and Guelph will be inaugurated next year, H. A. Blatchford of the Bell Telephone Co. told the North Halton Urban Board at last week's meeting in Georgetown.

Three Bell Telephone Co. representatives, from Oakville, Guelph and Brampton, H. Blatchford, L. Denby and W. Catalano, appeared before the Board to discuss the possibility of toll-free calling within the three towns of Acton, Milton, Georgetown and the surrounding areas.

The percentage of calls show that more long-distance calls are placed from a small area to a large area, back to the smaller.

Using the figure given, that 31.8% of the toll calls from Georgetown go in Brampton, Reeve John Elliott felt that it would be much better to have free calling to Brampton than to Acton. It was intimated that this might well happen in the next year or two.

Mayor Hyde suggested that since Acton is a free calling area, it should be in the same phone book as Georgetown. In reply, Mr. Denby pointed out

it would be nearly impossible to include in each phone book all the free calling areas. However, he stated that an Acton phone book would be given free on request.

The Bell representatives concluded by asking the Board to pass on any ideas or opinions to them, which might be helpful to them in knowing the reaction of their residents. "We know by the number of calls where the people want to call, but what we don't know is, are they willing to pay a rate increase rather than a toll," said Mr. Blatchford.

Board Chairman Councillor James Emmerson objected to County Council holding nearly all daylight meetings. He felt this prevented some men who could not get time off from work for running for reeve or deputy. He asked if County Council had passed a resolution to hold all meetings in the daytime. County Warden C. A. Martin, who was present, denied that any such motion had been passed.

He explained however, that in an attempt to reduce overtime pay to employees, a number of daytime meetings had been scheduled.

Reeve W. Denny, of Acton, agreed with the Warden, saying "It is impossible to get all the Committee meetings in either nights or days, we have to use both."

The next meeting will be April 17th in Milton.
