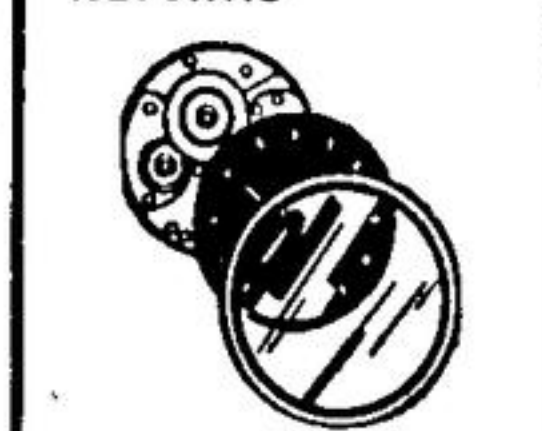
Production Certificate For Alexander Jersey
