Whether the CBC rendered a service or disservice in televising an interview with the head of the American Nazi movement Sunday night could be debated. The frank, blood-chilling interview was part of the challenging new show "This Hour Has 7 Days." We watched, with a sick feeling in the pit of our stomach, as a rather handsome young man explained what he would do if his party gained power in the States.

Like many bigots, he aims at communists, Jews and negroes, blames the world's problems on a "three per cent" and likens Hitler to Christ and himself to St. Paul, and discounts as fabrication the dreadful facts of the Nuremberg trials.

He would have a world led by what he terms Christian whites as the only people with the intelligence to rule.

We don't think the interview should have been televised. Suppression of "hate" literature is being actively pursued at present.

## Time, Gentlemen....

Flashed with his success in promoting a moderate group into international prominence, the master of Sunday night television, Ed Sullivan, is applying the same formula to other British imports with disastrous results.

Two weeks ago an audience of teenagers were incited to such frenzy that they played havoc with the rest of the Sullivan show, caused a major comedian to reach such a rage that he thumbed his nose at the audience, and disrupted the act of a clever impersonator. Subsequently, comedian Jackie Mason's contract was cancelled for further shows and he is now suing the program for damages.
