Oakville Cracks Down On Election Posters

Election campaign posters are coming down, as fast as they go up in the south of the county — but it's not the work of vandals or mischievous supporters of rival candidates.

W. W. Bateman, the supervisor of Oakville Parks Board, has instigated the war against what he calls "illegal election posters" — those that are heavily scattered throughout the town's parks.

Mr. Bateman started his poster removal campaign last week and today declared that his staff's determination to stop illegal posting of election posters in the town's green areas successful.

During the past week hundreds of placards were nailed in trees and park buildings. The offense carries a maximum fine of \$300 on conviction.

Mr. Bateman said about 40 posters had been taken down to date and a recent inspection shows they have not been replaced.

Last week the Parks Board sent a notice concerning the by-law to each candidate. Since the notices were mailed there have been no new postings.
