Ileostomy Group Explains Purpose Nurses Meeting

A general meeting of the Ileostomy Chapter, Registered Nurses Association of Ontario was held at the Knox Presbyterian Church Hall, Milton, on Tuesday, March 26th.

The guest speakers were members of the Ileostomy Association of Toronto. All members of this Association have undergone surgery and work to help other individuals to adjust to their new situations. There are groups all over the world in this well organized Association.

One of the most important aspects of this work is the function of the visiting committee. These individuals are trained for a short period and work by a procedure manual. Their purpose is to give moral support and encouragement to the new "Ileostomy" as well as technical education, so that the ileostomy becomes only a part of their life and does not become the centre.

Visitors are carefully chosen and will visit any patient on request whether or not this individual intends to become a member of the Association.

Slides were shown, commentary by Mr. Tom Clark, who is the vice president of the association. These showed various appliances and methods of changing.

Refreshments were then served and at this time the nurses met with the members of the Ileostomy Association for discussion.

A short business meeting followed at which time there were reports from the various committees.

Mrs. H. Kay, chairman of the Program and Public Relations Committee reported that the next meeting will be held during the last week in May in Georgetown. Miss D. A discussion ensued as to the advisability of deleting the category of associate membership and the general opinion was that those members should be retained.

Council Still Split On Convention Accounting
