**SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS**

Pickering season opens May 11th at 12:01 p.m. This earlier opening for pickering was announced last week by Dr. C. H. D. Clarke, chief of Wildlife and Enforcement Section.

The May 11th opening DOES NOT INCLUDE the French River, Lake Nipissing or the Mattawa River. The season there remains May 15th. Closing dates remain the same for Northern Ontario, April 14th, Southern Ontario, March 31st.

Because outfitters, lodge owners and sportsmen have been stocked in southern Ontario with some success, Jack Davis, Upland Game warden, chairman of the Federation, and not included in Southern Ontario. Casually these three bodies of water are used as a boundary between north and south Ontario and are considered southern Ontario.

Trout season may open on April 27th. At the time of printing this had not been announced yet. I suggest you watch the daily papers for any changes.

Speaking of trout and an earlier season. Worms are, and always will be, a great fish-killer. Many fishermen will argue this point. But the fact remains, long before this fishery is over, worms are causing 60 inches of snow and temperatures of 20-25 degrees below zero needs much help from the sportsmen.
