W. George Kerr, Burlington lawyer and Progressive Conserva tive candidate for the provin cial legislature said today he had no definite word of a fourth coming by election for Halton County. Halton has been without re presentation in the provincial government since the death last August of Stanley Hall, P.C. M.P. A county Junior Chamber of Commerce has demanded that Premier John Roberts call a by election immediately and mem bers said they understood Mr. Kerr would make the announce ment Wednesday when address ing their dinner meeting. Kerr said however he had not been informed of an impending election. His announcement, he said had nothing to do with elections but would be of in terest to Oakville's business community. Saturday, Burlington Mayor Owen Mullin, who will be a la boral candidate in a Halton el ection, said he believed the Progressive Conservatives were afraid to hold a by election and would hold off until a general election. A provincial election must be held by 1964.

Set May 15th Date Next Blood Clinic

The Georgetown Branch of the Red Cross have set the date of their next blood donor clinic here. It will be Wednes day, May 15th in Knox Church Hall. While blood can be stored in Ontario 6,000 blood dona tions must be collected every week to ensure an adequate supply of blood and blood products for all hospitals. There is no substitute for blood. It must be given by healthy people between the ages of 18 and 65. A simple test is given to every donor to make sure that the three quarters of a pint can be spared. Every donor is a part of the program. Specially trained nurses take the donations. All testing and typing of blood is done by hands of skilled technicians.

Outlines Ewart College Missionary Training

On Wednesday afternoon in Knox Church Hall, the W. Ewart College held its 10th anniversary meeting.
