MINOR BASEBALL NEWS

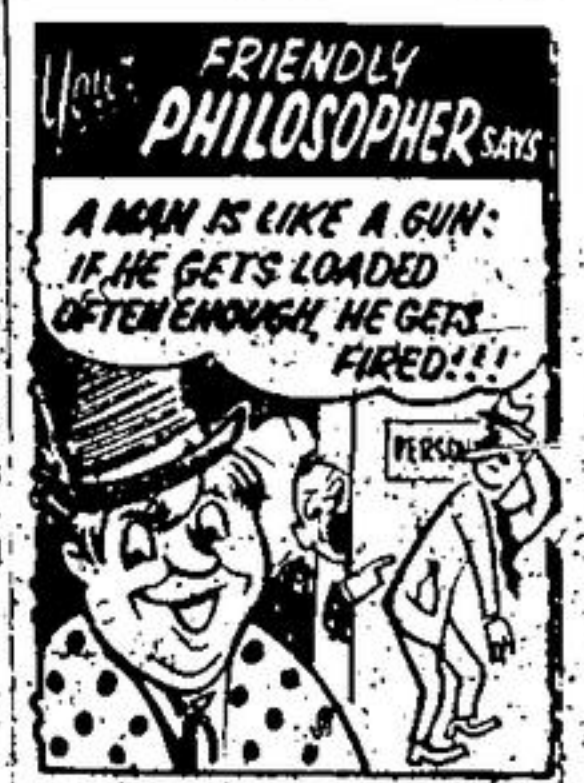

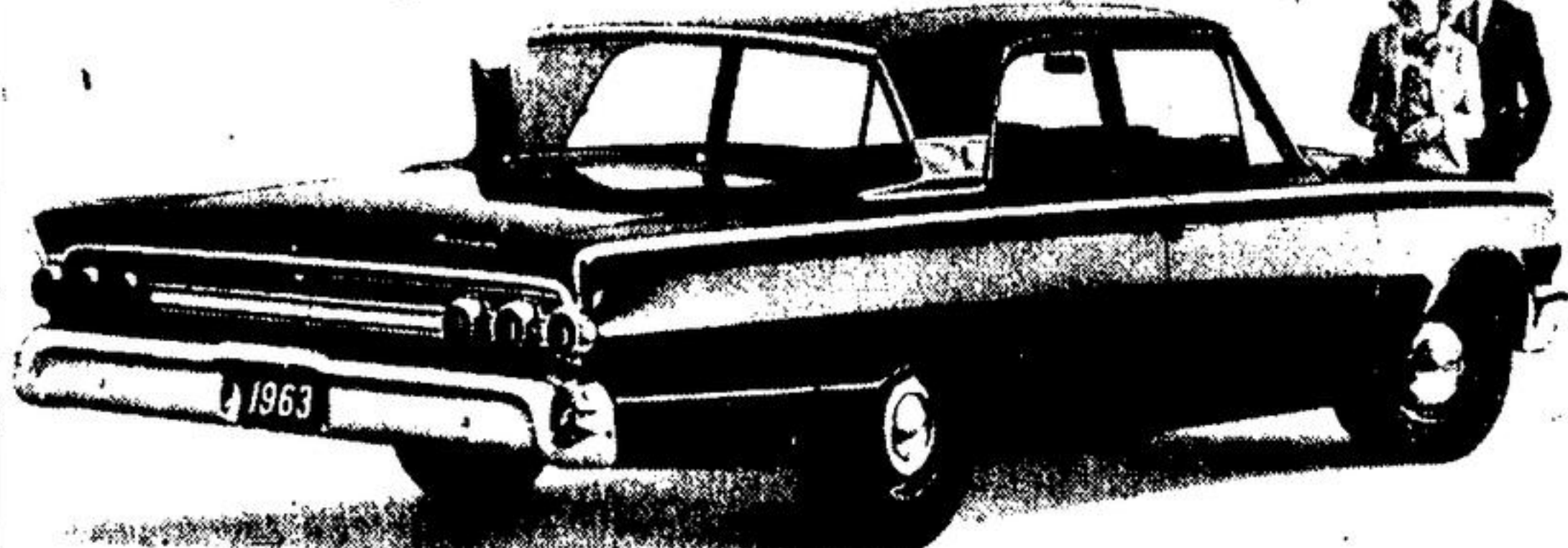
