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Short Term Debentures

Saving Town \$14,000

Originally planned to be paid over thirty years, the sewage pumping station for Georgetown's new industrial area will be debentured over the next five years, council learned on Monday.

"\$14,304 in 5 1/2% debentures will be issued through Central Mortgage and Housing to pay for the pump station. We'll save \$12,000 over the shorter term," Mayor Hyde said.

Reeve Elliott said that if the town had been able to issue debentures in this way when the disposal plant was built considerable more money could have been saved.

"More than \$200,000" said the mayor ruefully.
