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Plan Early Start Spring Road Work

An early start to spring road work in town was intimated in a number of decisions made Monday by council.

The engineer was asked to invite tenders for truck rentals and truck haulage of granular materials for roads, and to call tenders for surface treatment of several streets. Tenders are also being invited for supplying granular materials.

Mayor Hyde said he hopes much of the work can be done by early June and if so there will be a saving on dust control.

Study Fine Levying for Grass Fire Offenders

A by-law providing for the levying of fines on persons responsible for setting and lighting grass fires, is being studied by members of Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau.

At its April meeting, the Bureau held a discussion on the by-law, in effect in other municipalities, some providing fines up to \$400, and the by-law agreed it was true Halton County should have a similar by-law. Richard Duron, K.C. lies to cut down on the needless and rash of spring grass fires. The Bureau will contact Halton County council or its solicitor to see if the council could recommend a by-law that each local municipal council could adopt for use in their own fire area.
