Play was even in the early part of the game and both teams were held scoreless until the Harlequins were awarded a penalty kick. The shot taken by George Jones, traveled fifty yards with a tail wind and split the uprights. Dead centre Brantford applied pressure for the remainder of the half but were unable to pile up an overwhelming margin due to some great defending by the Beavers. Georgetown managed to get on the score-sheet themselves and the half ended 9-3.

Holding the ball penalties cost the Beavers heavily in the second session. From their 5 yard line Georgetown fumbled the ball and gave Brantford a cast. The Beavers warned to the task and in three successive plays from the half way line the ball was grounded on 12 inches, 2 feet and 3 feet short.

Beaver captain, Ken Hogg made no mistake on a penalty kick from the 35 yard line and it was 12-6 Brantford. In jones and continuing influence of the rest of the game and the visitors added 6 points to their total to gain an 18-6 triumph.

Mark Ebleweth, 15, who went to the game to watch his father, Don, play found himself in uniform and substituted for one of the team's strongest wing forwards. He came through in fine style saving at least one sure score with a speedy running play. Both teams were entertained at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis after the game.

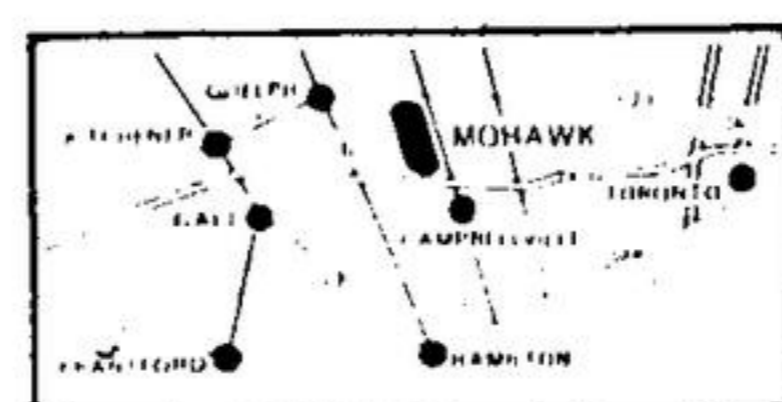
