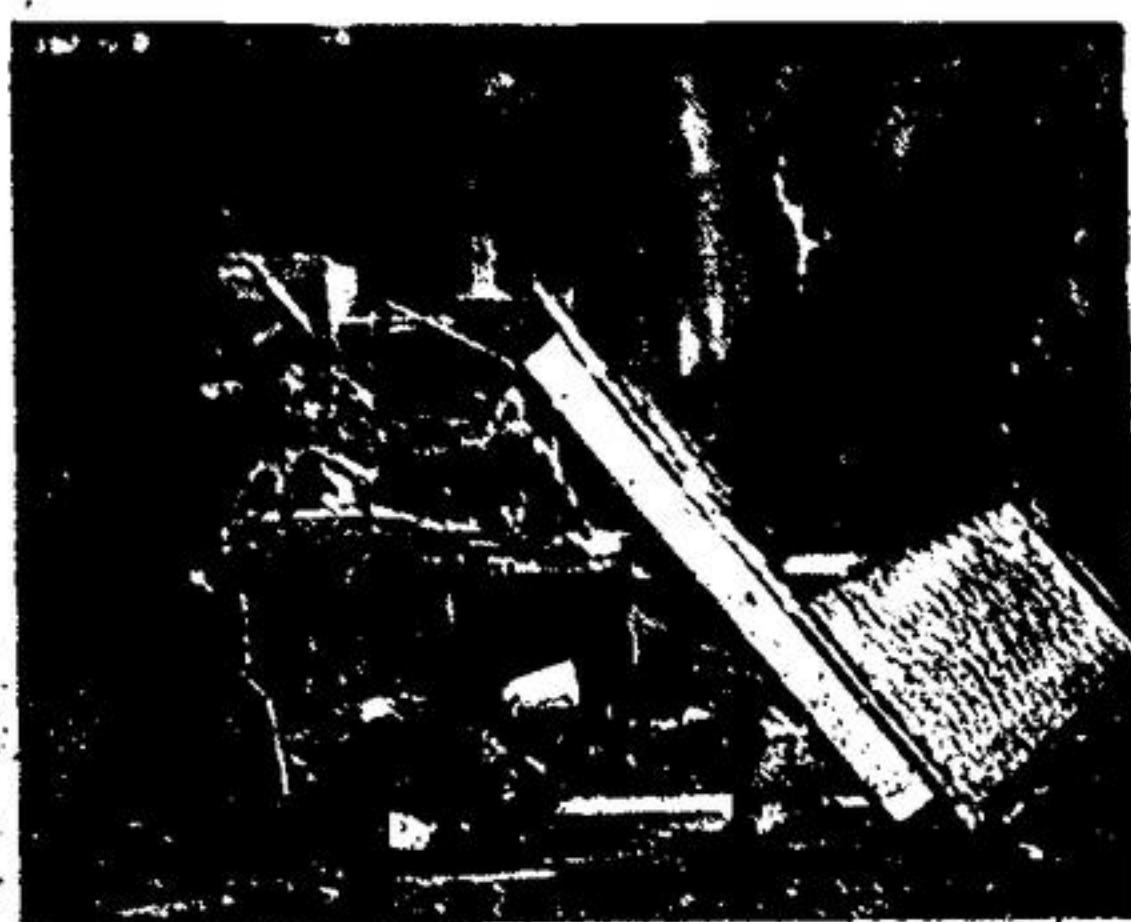
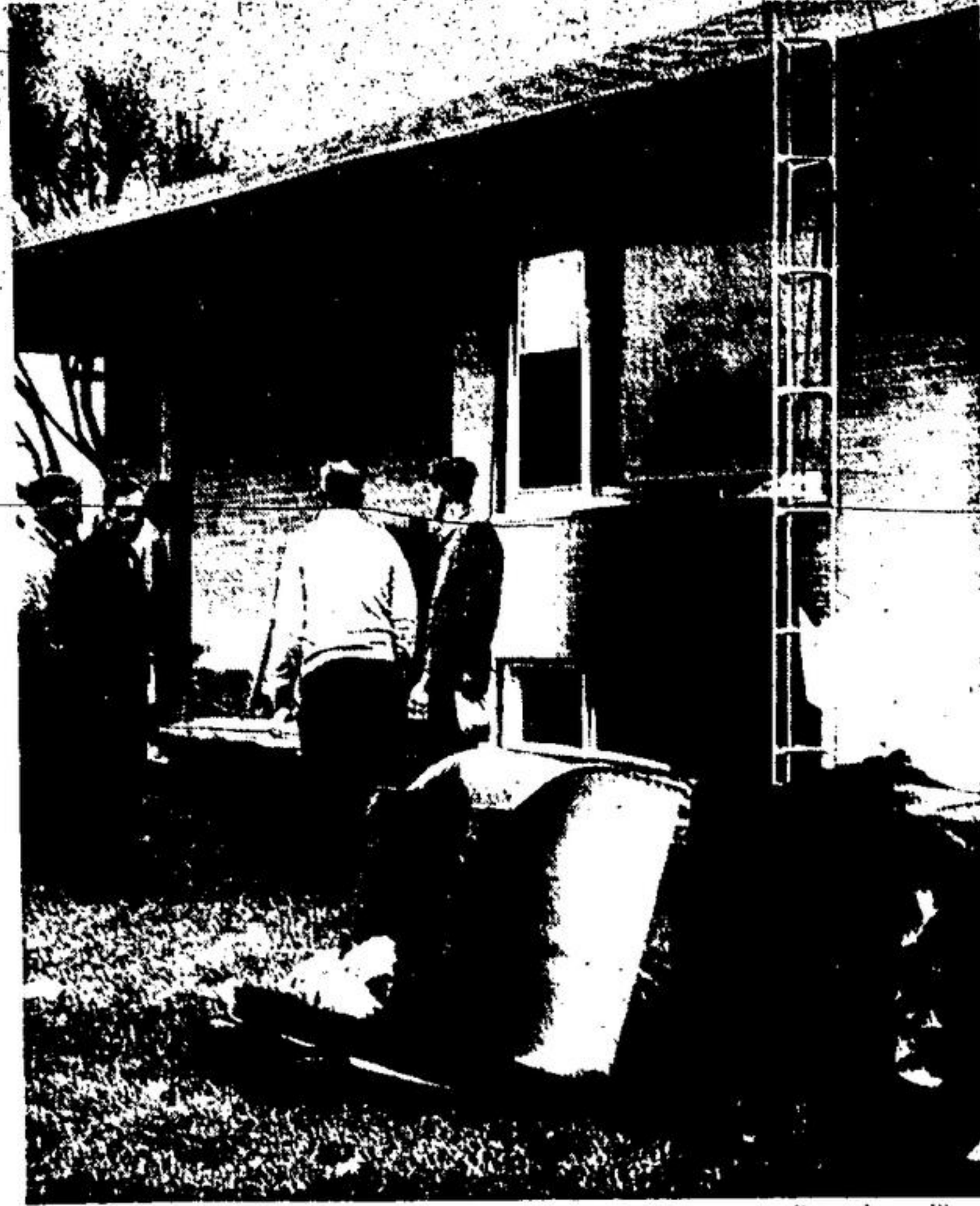


Bolt Hit TV HOME BLACKENED BY LIGHTNING FIRE
