The oldest town resident who claimed Georgetown as her birthplace, Mrs. John W. Adams, 95, died at her home, 31 Church St., on April 22nd. The former Annie Kennedy, she was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George H. Kennedy. With the exception of twenty years in Buffalo, N.Y., where her daughter Jean was superintendent of student nurses in a Buffalo hospital, she had spent her entire life in town. Her husband, who died 93 years ago, operated a grocery store on Main St. in a building later destroyed by fire, which stood on the Main and Church corner where Bradbury's store is located. Mrs. Adams was a devoted member of the Methodist and later St. John's United Church. She had served as president of the Women's Missionary Society, and of the Ladies Aid, and taught Sunday School. She had been a member of the Local Council of Women.

Despite her advanced years, she did her own housework and was fond of working in her garden. A son Carl died some years ago and a daughter Mrs. Myrtle Junkin predeceased her mother five years ago.
