Two New Stamps On Sale Today

The Post Office Department today released information on the new two-cent and three-cent regular issue Queen Elizabeth Stamp which will go on sale on May 2nd.

These new stamps showing a portrait of Queen Elizabeth, executed by Ernest Roch of Montreal are the last stamps in the series of low denomination stamps begun in October of last year. Each of the stamps bears in the upper left hand corner a symbol of a segment of the Canadian economy.

Portrayed on the new two-cent stamp is a tree, symbolic of Canada's forestry and forest products industries. On the new three-cent stamp, there is a fish, representative of the fishing industry.

Halton Setting Pace In FAME Debentures

At a meeting of the Halton County FAME Committee recently 16 new shares and one \$3,000 debenture were turned into the provincial director Archie Service. The sale of shares totals over \$200,000 with a membership of 243.

A news letter was received from FAME headquarters informing the group a few countries have 2000 well over their quota. The quota is an arbitrary figure established after a great deal of research.

The following have all exceeded their quota. Halton, still on top percentage wise, followed by Brant, Victoria, Dundas and Peel. Perth County has subscribed over \$100,000 in shares with a quota of \$100,000. Many others are rapidly approaching their objective.

Lloyd May county committee chairman and top salesman for the county, reported he had now sold 104 shares and the first debenture sold in the county.

Archie Service explained that FAME debentures can now be sold to the public as well as shareholders, also that the first plant at ASR is to start very soon. The lenders for the building are to be let immediately.
