1963 Minor Ball Playing Rules

ATOM GROUP
(8 years old as of May 1, 1963)
Atom players will run 60 feet.
Atom pitchers will throw 40 feet.
No base stealing permitted.
No advance permitted on a passed ball or missed third strike.
Advance is permitted when pitcher misses throw back from catcher.
Atom players may lead off base.
Umpires will not call balks on pitchers.

PEEWEE GROUP
(10 years old as of May 1, 1963)
PeeWee players will run 75 feet.
PeeWee pitchers will throw 60 feet.
Baseball rules will apply to this group on a trial basis for 3 weeks.

BANTAM GROUP
(13 years old as of May 1, 1963)
Bantam players will run 82 feet.

1. Bantam pitchers will throw 55 feet.
All regular baseball rules apply to the Bantam group.
The home team will occupy the third base side of the diamond.
All official rules to apply with the following exceptions:
(1) Before the start of each game the coach of each team will prepare a batting order consisting of all players present. Late arrivals must be immediately added to the bottom end of the batting order.
(2) When a team is at bat all players, whether bench warmers or not, will bat in order (including play-offs).
(3) Coaches should see to it that all players participate for some portion of each game as fielders (including play-offs).
(4) Adult coaches and managers are to direct play from the bench and at no time during the game are to question the decision of the umpire. The coaches should encourage the players not to question the calls of the umpire.
(5) Coaches and managers may act as first base and third base coaches.
(6) At no time may participating players or coaches stand behind the backstop screen.
(7) All games to start on time as scheduled.
(8) To avoid foul play a team may borrow a player or players from the position it needs, and it may play with less than 9 players or will forfeit the game.
(9) Wins will be scored as follows: Two as one point each.
(10) No game shall be longer than six full innings. However, no full inning should start after 8:15. The ending of a game in darkness or other natural elements is left to the discretion of the umpire and umpires meeting to an even number will be governed by official rules. (Under no circumstances will be 8:30 with no exceptions.)
(11) Any game called after three full innings have been played will be considered and scored as a fully completed game. Less than three even innings will require a replay if it has any bearing on the league standings.
(12) The use of batting helmets is mandatory.
(13) No metal spikes to be worn.
