Fred noticed what appeared to be a piece of bone protruding from the side of an eroded bank about four feet below the surface of the ground. A little digging produced a giant tooth that measured 4 1/2 inches in length and 1 1/2 inches in width. The tooth was broken off, with his brother, Newton, he continued to probe the ground around it and in minutes discovered other similar teeth. Two others were found in the bottom of the ditch near where the flood waters entered a culvert. (Left) John Mische, a local authority on Indian lore and a personal friend of Fred's, continued the search and came across a pocket of ashes, the remains of a large fire, at the same level. The tooth mysteriously came out of something that doesn't walk those parts any more. But the meaning of the discovery wasn't known until the teeth were inspected by a museum zoologist. Fred says he intends to take them to the Royal Ontario Museum in Toronto to see what light they can shed on the mystery. The Riddell farm is on the 5th line of Esqueving, south-west of town.

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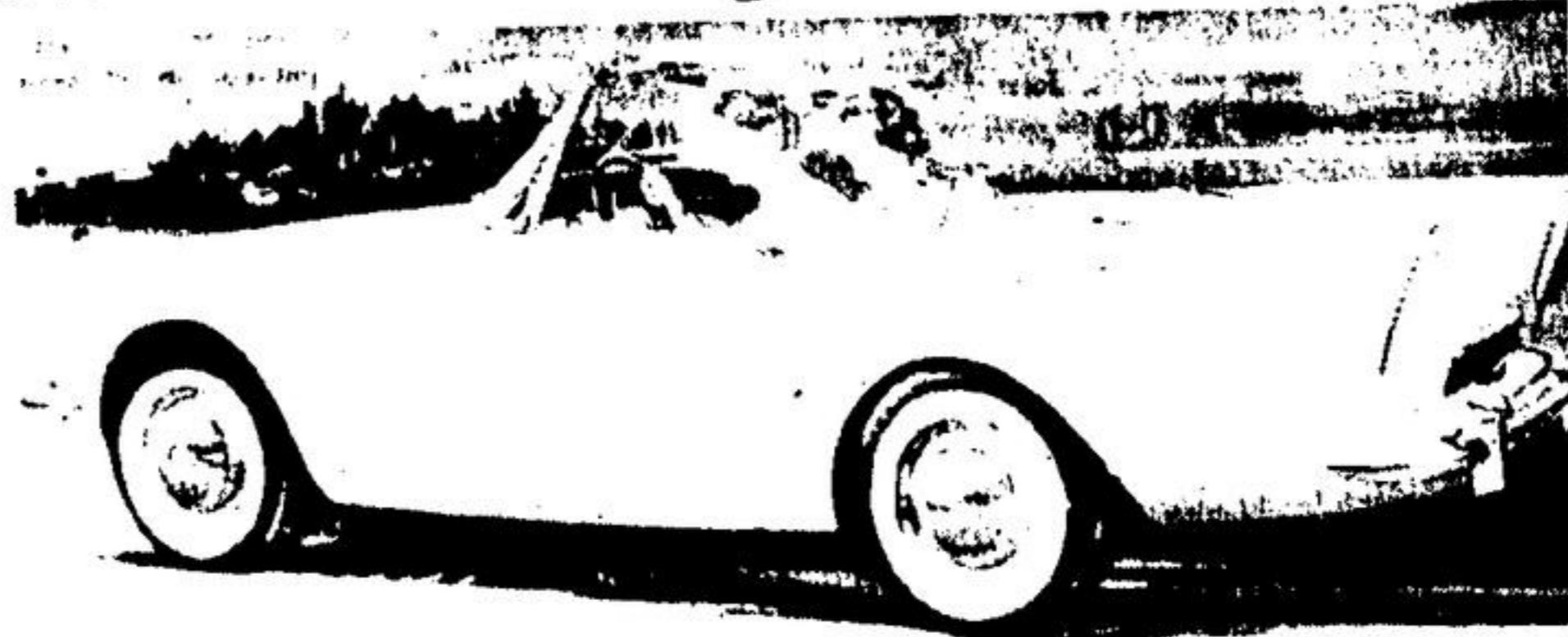
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
