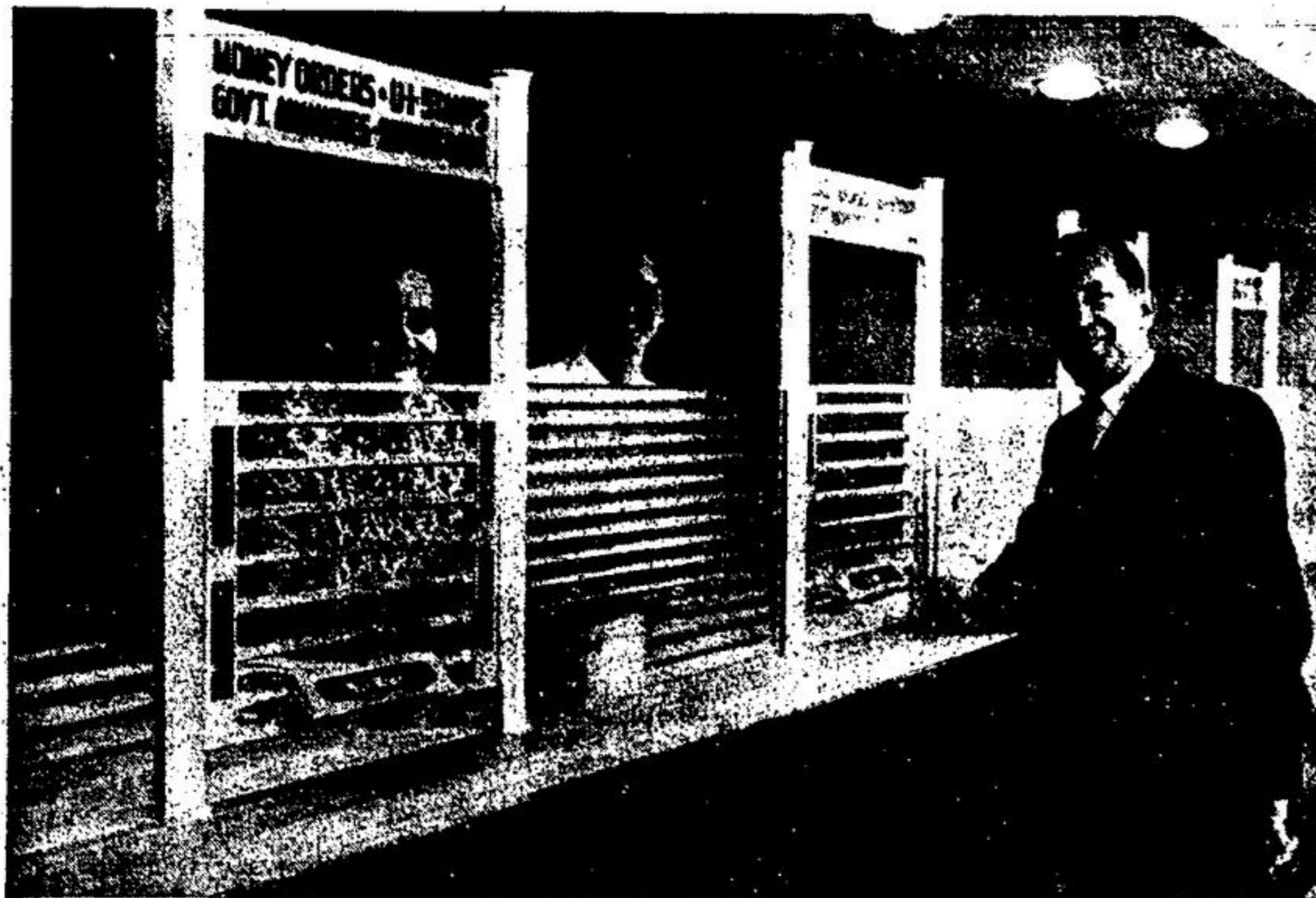


POST OFFICE MOVED
