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CAR-GO-RAIL—With its new package plan—Car-Go-Rail—Canadian National Railways on June 15 launches a unique travel scheme in Canada. Linda Prew demonstrates the components—specially designed automobile-carrying railway cars, a combination ticket to cover transportation of both travelers and car, and the automobile itself. Operating between either Montreal and Toronto and three western Canada cities—Winnipeg, Edmonton and Vancouver—the new plan for the first time in Canada allows passengers and their automobiles to travel by train so that the automobiles are available at destination. The Car-Go-Rail scheme combines the flexibility of automobile travel with the speed and relaxation of train travel.
