A. G. BELL'S PROPHECY

"It is conceivable that cables of telephone wires could be laid underground or suspended overhead, communicating with private dwellings, counting houses, manufactories. . . Not only so, but I believe in the future, wires will unite different cities and a man in one part of the country may communicate by word of mouth with another in a distant place."
