John Mullin, Balton's Liberal provincial candidate in the forthcoming Provincial Election said new race tracks in Campbellville now congested by the Georgetown traffic to the race track and supports the principle of developing the Ninth Line from 401 to the Highway. It was also said that the Town of Georgetown overlooked.
