Thursday Frost Kills Off Tomato Plants

Frost Thursday night killed off the tomato plants already set out in Halton County. The same situation applies in Peel county and North Westworth.

Earle Muir, fruit and vegetable extension specialist with the provincial department of agriculture office here, said that approximately one quarter of the normal acreage was out in the field by Thursday and all was completely destroyed.

He said the fields could be re-set but there would be a "scramble" for replacement plants and there might not be sufficient available.

"It is too early to give an estimate on the damage to tree fruit," Mr. Muir said. "There must have been some but we can't put a figure on it yet."

In the case of potatoes, the tops were frosted off if they were exposed but the crop would probably not be a total loss since other shoots would come up later, Mr. Muir explained. Maturing has been delayed, however, by the frost.

Strawberry plants in the county lost 60 per cent of their flowers due to the frost. "This may not mean a 60 per cent loss in crop since secondary flowers that would not have normally amounted to a great deal may now come ahead," Mr. Muir said.

For some time to come it was felt the Registry Office could well house both the Health Unit and any overflow from the Children's Aid.

Another request for space was rejected when Magistrate Kenneth M. Langdon asked for juvenile and family court officers in Georgetown. Council stated they had already reserved space for these facilities in the old Court House. The changes started after the county officers and council chambers and court rooms were moved to the new building, outside Milton.
