...with the operation of Acton Limestone Quarries, one of our biggest industries.

A letter protesting the by-law will be sent to the Department of Highways and the Town of Acton.

The minimum ground floor area for a residence in Esqueving was raised from eight hundred square feet, to one thousand square feet, by the amendment of the building by-law.

Council re-read their by-law Monday night. This footage is preventing building on flood exclusive of porches and verandahs.

For a storey and a half house the square footage has been raised from 750 square feet on the first floor to eight hundred and twenty-five, and for a full two storey house, the ground floor must have at least seven hundred and fifty square feet, an increase of one hundred square feet.

In addition if the house has no basement the overall square footage must be increased by 150 square feet.

In surrounding townships the requirements are: From a Planning Committee of the 800 sq. ft. "Nassica" area, 920 sq. ft. "Chesed" section, 1000 sq. ft. in the open and let our rate payers know what we're doing.
