Silvercreek-Ballinafad Insists on Georgetown

Ratepayers in the area north of town affected by the controversial change of high school boundaries are making an 11th hour bid to block the shifting of their children from Georgetown to Acton.

At a meeting of the Georgetown High School Board last week a copy of a letter sent to the county council solicitor was read urging the county officials to hold the third reading of the by-law making the boundary changes official until each of the five municipalities involved—Esquesing, Georgetown, Acton, Nassagaweya, and Milton passed separate resolutions okaying the change.

County Council has already given first and second readings to the by-law, and meet again in mid-month.

Solicitor George Kerr of Burlington, acting on behalf of the ratepayers in the Silvercreek-Ballinafad area asked the Georgetown and Acton boards to consider their objections.

The board touched on the change of boundaries later in the meeting when they discussed the transportation policy for students in the controversial area. Georgetown High School students currently in grades 11, 12, 13 will be allowed to finish their education here but must find their own transportation.

Lower grade students from the area, who wish to take the technical course here must apply for permission from Acton board. Technically they may attend Georgetown High for free until January.

After the first of the year when the boundary change, if passed, would take effect, the Acton board would be charged fees.

At the same meeting the board okayed application from three high school students to attend technical courses elsewhere. Roger Schiefel and Jim Thompson will attend Central Tech, and Graham Wood will enroll in a special arts course at Thistleton.

The resignation of another teacher, Peter Bright, was accepted, bringing to ten the number of teachers who will not return to teach here next term.
