The provincial government will support a \$5,500,000 flood control project by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, Lands and Forests Minister Robert said this week. He told representatives of 31 Ontario conservation authorities that he would urge federal participation in the project. Preliminary engineering discussions have already begun with the federal government. The flood control and water conservation plan will include six reservoirs and three major channel improvements. Construction of the Grangeville dam is projected to begin in the 1963-64 fiscal year, the minister said.
