Wife of Stratford Customs Collector

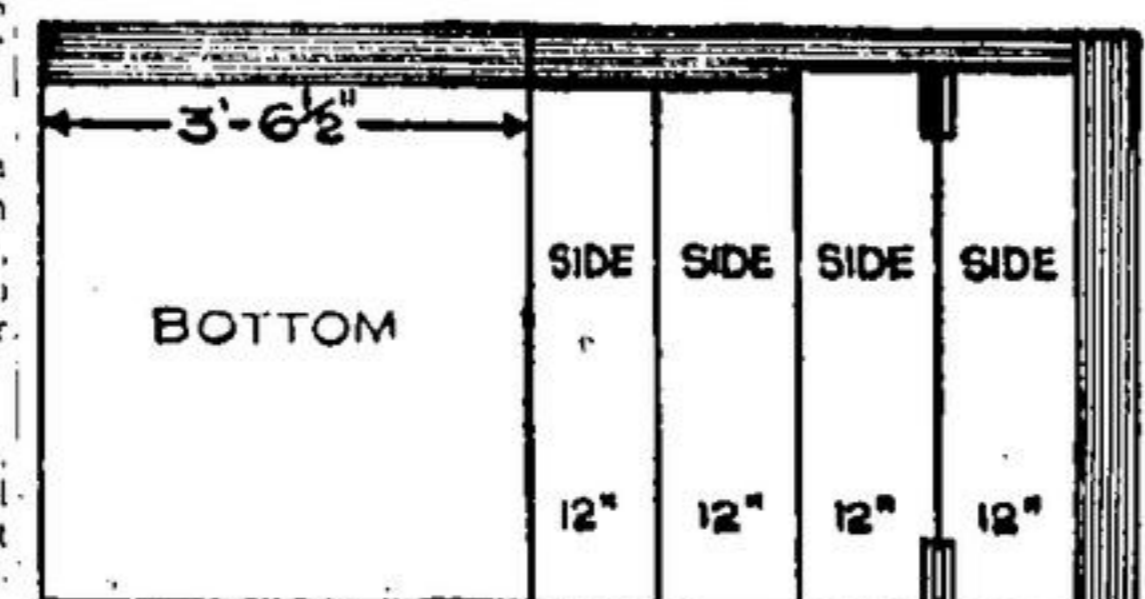
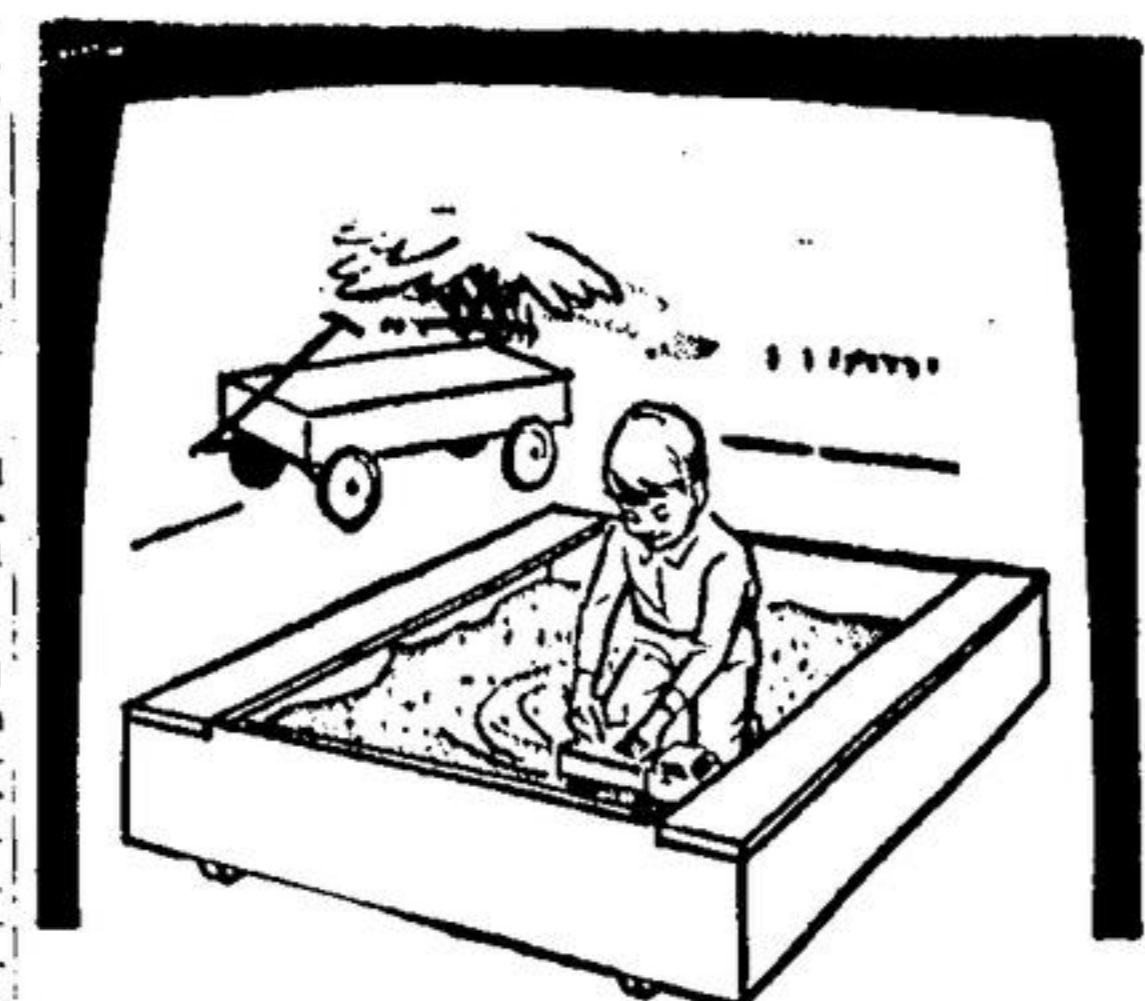
Mrs. Bessie Macdonald, 61, whose daughter is a Georgetown resident, died suddenly in Stratford on May 30th.

The former Bessie Harland, she was born in Clinton, moved to Guelph as a child and later to Stratford where she had lived since 1931.

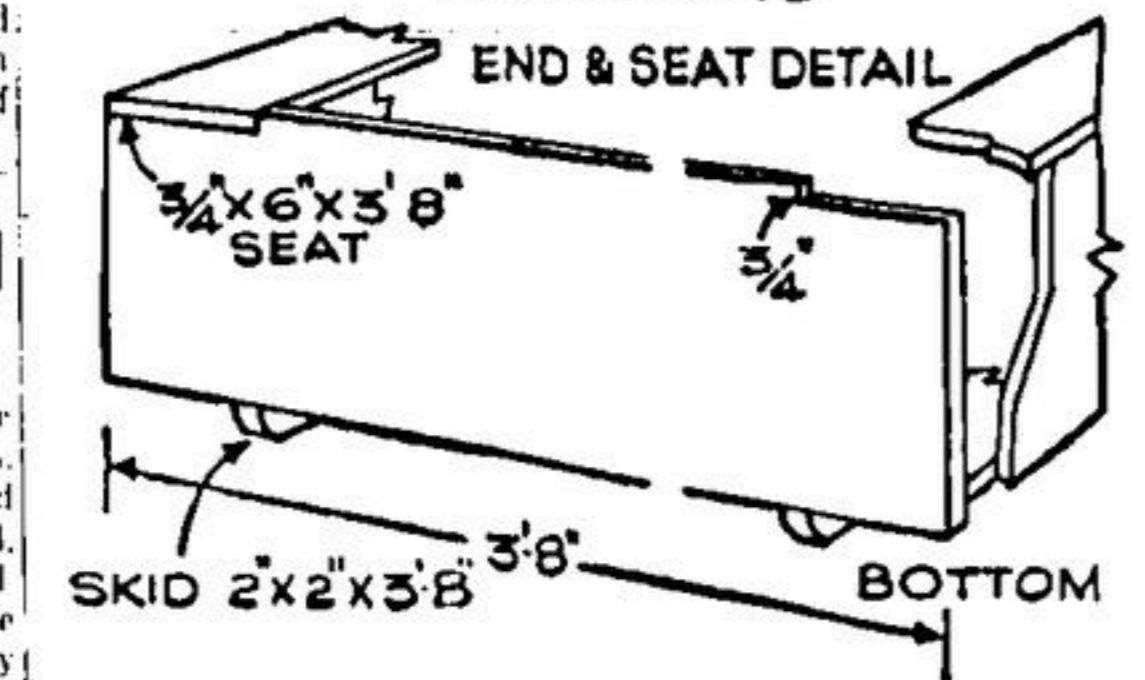

Build It Yourself



3/4" x 4'0" x 8'0" WATERPROOF GLUE FIR PLYWOOD



Here's a long-lasting fir plywood sandbox that's easily made

Mighty construction and explanation. When measuring make allowance for the width of the in your backyard with a saw cuts.

Secure the skids to the bottom with a tough plywood and nail gongers like this one. Use 1 1/2" galvanized wood screws throughout. See All youngsters love to scratch are the seats and level the lid around in a sand pile. Skids on both ends. Round off and they're ready for paint. Drill all edges and sharp corners if necessary, so why not have a terror house paint primer and a coat of quality exterior house paint.
