QUAGMIRE HALTED GEORGETOWN LINE SOUTH

A QUAGMIRE OF JELLIED MUD faced Canadian National Railways workmen when they attempted to reconstruct the CNR line through Esqueusing Township. A 9,000 foot long water table southwest of town held up construction for a year, but draining has begun and they hope to complete the Georgetown-Milton link this summer. Above the mud and water are shown just north of No. 10 sideroad.

Promises Halton M.P.P. "Before Next Session"

Consider Redesign For Campbellville Cloverleaf

Halton County will be represented in Queen's Park before another session of the Legislature is called to order, Premier Roberts told a sun-drenched gathering at Lowville, Sunday, June 8.

Standing in shirt sleeves and on the back of a truck, Roberts assured the 1,500 attending the annual Halton County Conservative Association's annual picnic that he and his government is aware you people have been without representation since the death of Stanley Hall last August.

"But, he said, 'I promise you here now that before another session is called Halton County will have representation'."

Roberts explained he was unable to call a Halton by-election while the Legislature was in session because such procedure is prohibited.

Then he gave his strongest hint yet that a provincial election was forthcoming.

He said: "The life of a parliament is four years and a by-election now is not the wisest course of action. It could mean the new candidate would never get a chance to sit in the Legislature before facing a general election."

The crowd spread itself around Lowville park while the Premier spoke.

He also said consideration is now being given to redesigning and reconstructing the Hwy. 401 cloverleaf outside Campbellville.

He said the Dept of Highways is aware of the increase in traffic using this cutoff since the new Mohawk race track was opened.

The track is just north of Campbellville and the cloverleaf.

Roberts further said it will be necessary to improve connecting roads in the Campbellville area which lead to Hwy 401 because of increased traffic.

He then called on the gathering to support Halton PC candidate George Kerr of Burlington.

"I want George on my team and I want you to put him there," he declared.

He challenged Halton Tories to "get out and work for George Kerr. We need him."

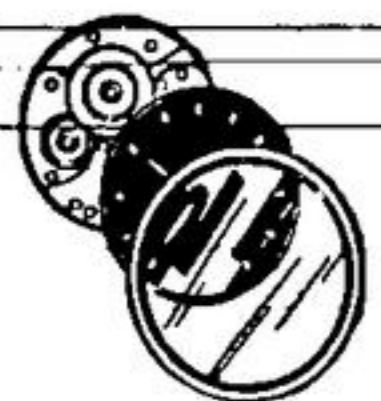
The Burlington councillor shared the platform with Roberts and joined in paying a verbal tribute to the late Stanley Hall.

Council Must Endorse Hydro Tree Cutting

A council motion on Monday will require the hydro commission to request council permission before felling any trees on town property.

The Hildebrandt-Young motion was prompted by an incident last week when council vetoed the planned felling of a tree on Mountainview Road which councillors claimed could be saved by relocating a hydro pole.

"Hydro doesn't make a practice of cutting trees unnecessarily," said Mayor Hyde "and I doubt if this motion will have too much effect on hydro operation."

"Why oppose it then?" asked Cr Hildebrandt.

"Why present it?" answered the mayor. "We should know our rights and the hydro's before we take such action."

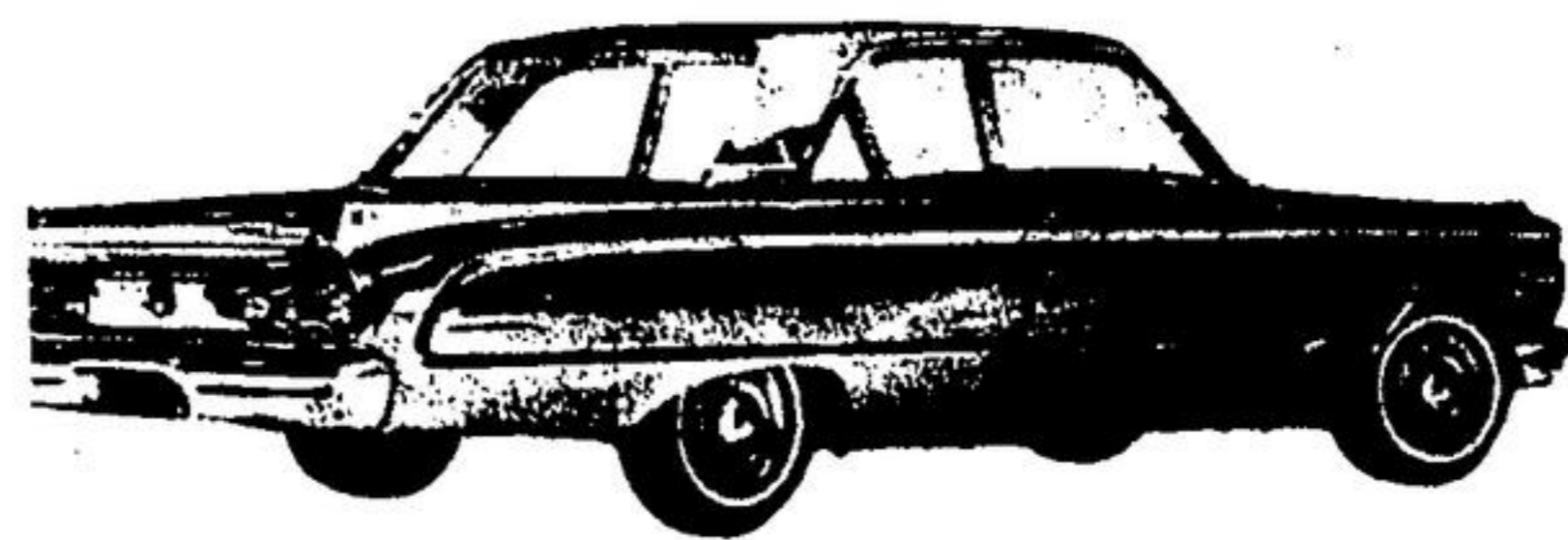
