


FIRST CANCELLATION

Twelve are Injured in Six District Crashes

Twelve people suffered injuries in six area motor vehicle accidents investigated by North Halton investigation OPR during the past week.

At Norval last Thursday June 13th Ralph Latter, the driver of a 1961 Volkswagen coach, and a passenger James Lawrence Weatherby, both of Brampton suffered lacerations about their heads and faces caused by the opposite side hit the curb and rolled over in the north ditch.

They were taken to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital by the GVAS. The accident happened at about 9:30 p.m. and was investigated by G. Bennett. He placed damage to the car at \$300. On So. 5 sideroad just west of the 9th line south of town at 1933 DeSoto, was completely wrecked when it went out of control on a curve and plunged into a ditch. The driver, Mrs. Elizabeth Denning, of 48 Main St. S., Georgetown received lacerations to the right side of her face, a fractured left wrist and other cuts and bruises. Her husband, Mr. K. G. Jennings received a fractured left hand and bruises. The accident happened at about 9 a.m. on Saturday June 15th.

A car driven by Edward Raymond Smith of R.R. 1, Georgetown was damaged to the extent of \$100 when it left the main pavement and rolled over in the Silver Creek corner in Georgetown June 16th. The car, a 1961 Volkswagen, was south bound. The accident occurred shortly after 5 p.m. on Wednesday. Mr. Stewart of Brampton, brother of Moses Foster, who was suffering lacerations to his face and head when his 1959 Plymouth wandered off the No. 7 line at Hwy. 21, School Rd. Hwy. 21 east of the town line, careened to the opposite side of the road and plowed down a hillside embankment on May 26. This one occurred at 1:42 p.m. on Saturday. He was rescued from a broken hospital bed on the scene.

The most serious accident was suffered by a 16-year-old boy from Georgetown, June 17th. He was driving his 1962 Ford when he lost control of the car and ran into a tree.
