EDITORIAL COMMENT

Inauspicious Start

When the federal Liberals were elected and Walter Gordon became linance minister we jokingly said that he would neverbe so popular as at that moment.

And a scant two months later it has me proven all tob true, ...

Mr. Gordon brought down a bodget. And like all budgets it came in for immediate criticism by the opposition. That's pol-

But a few days later he made the unpardonable error of reversing opinion on one of the most important budget features a 30 per cent sales tax on a business which is sold to foreign investors.

We do not pretend to be even an amateur economist, and we cannot rule on the right or wrong of the legislation.

What worries us is an opinion change such a short time later, which would indicate either that Mr. Gordon is somewhat

muddled in his thinking, or that powerful. interests persuaded him to change his mind. Whichever the case, if has done in repairable damage to his image as the bright mind of the government.

Newspapers which had been supporting him have been outspoken in their condemnation. Several have called for his resig-

While we would not go that far, we do say that the public is entitled to an explanation for the about-face other than the 'administrative difficulties' which Mr. Gordon said was the reason for the reversal.

If it's only administrative difficulties Mr. Gordon knows that he could easily check with those who set up the Ontario sales tax. We guarantee there are more confusing regulations there than any federal party could dream up in a century in


