Fire Bureau Lays Plans October Safety Campaign

To help broaden its fire safety program in the industrial field, the Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau has decided to offer cooperation to the newly-formed Halton and Peel Section of the Industrial Accident Prevention Association Inc. Meeting in Milton, the Fire Prevention Bureau members agreed to have Oakville fire fighter Ken Pollock, a member of the I.A.P.A., suggest a program of mutual cooperation between the two bodies at the fall meeting of I.A.P.A. The Bureau felt fire safety was an important part of any industrial safety program, and has volunteered to offer aid whenever it is needed.

The Bureau is presently doing some early planning for the October Fire Prevention Week program, with a church parade, fire inspection blitz, poster contest, and a general public information campaign planned.

Halton County Industrial Committee has asked the Bureau if it would participate in a Halton display at the World Plowing Match in Caledon October 8-12, and Chief Doug Wilson of Oakville agreed to contact the county and work out details.

Deputy Chief Bill Williams of Acton Fire Department, vice-chairman of the Bureau, reported on his attendance at a basic course in the industrial fire inspector's course in the field of the Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau recently and suggested a similar course in this district would be helpful to Halton's firefighters. Fire inspections play a big part in the Bureau's home and industrial fire prevention activities.

Permission was granted for the Kitchener Fire Prevention Bureau to copy the Halton Bureau's restaurant place mats. The place mats carry fire prevention messages and are distributed free to all Halton restaurants and eating establishments during Fire Prevention Week, October 1-7.

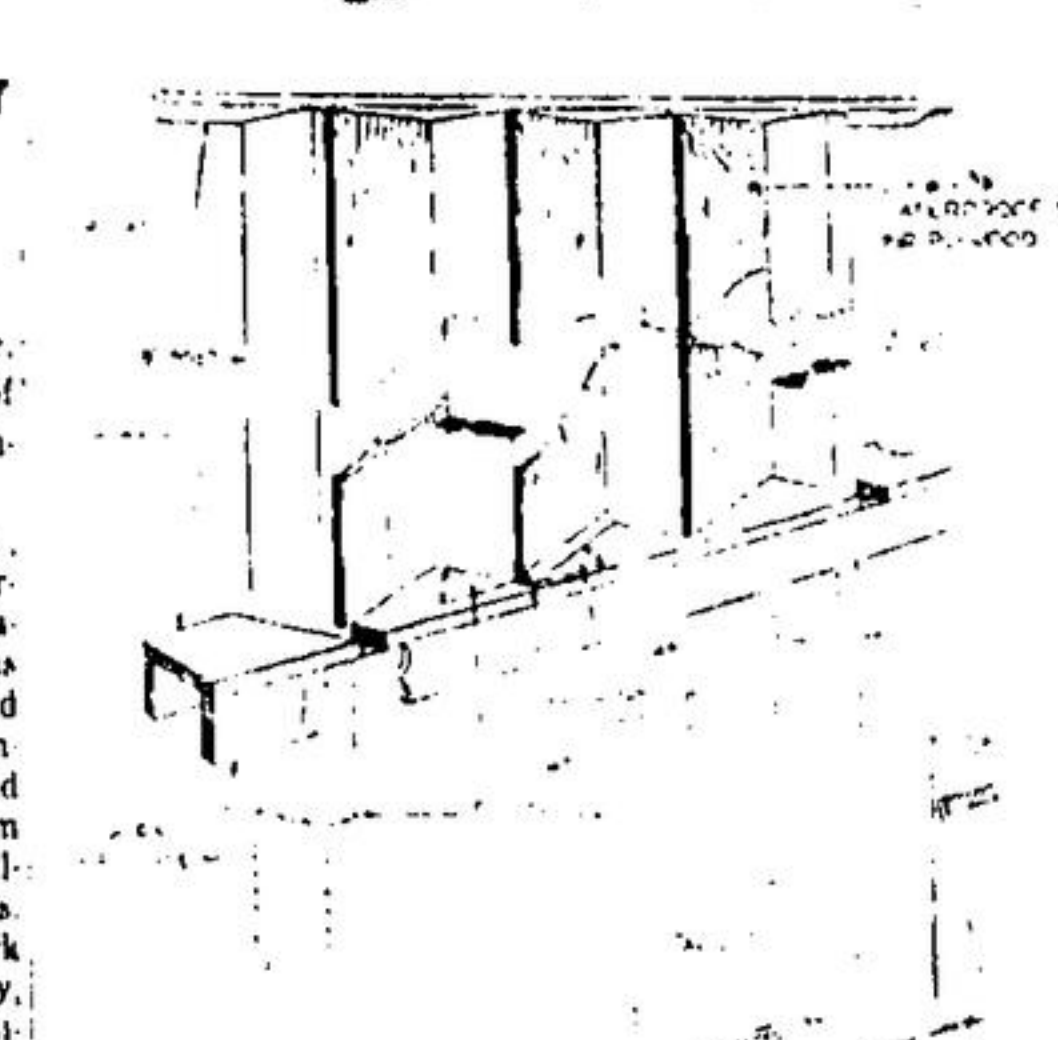
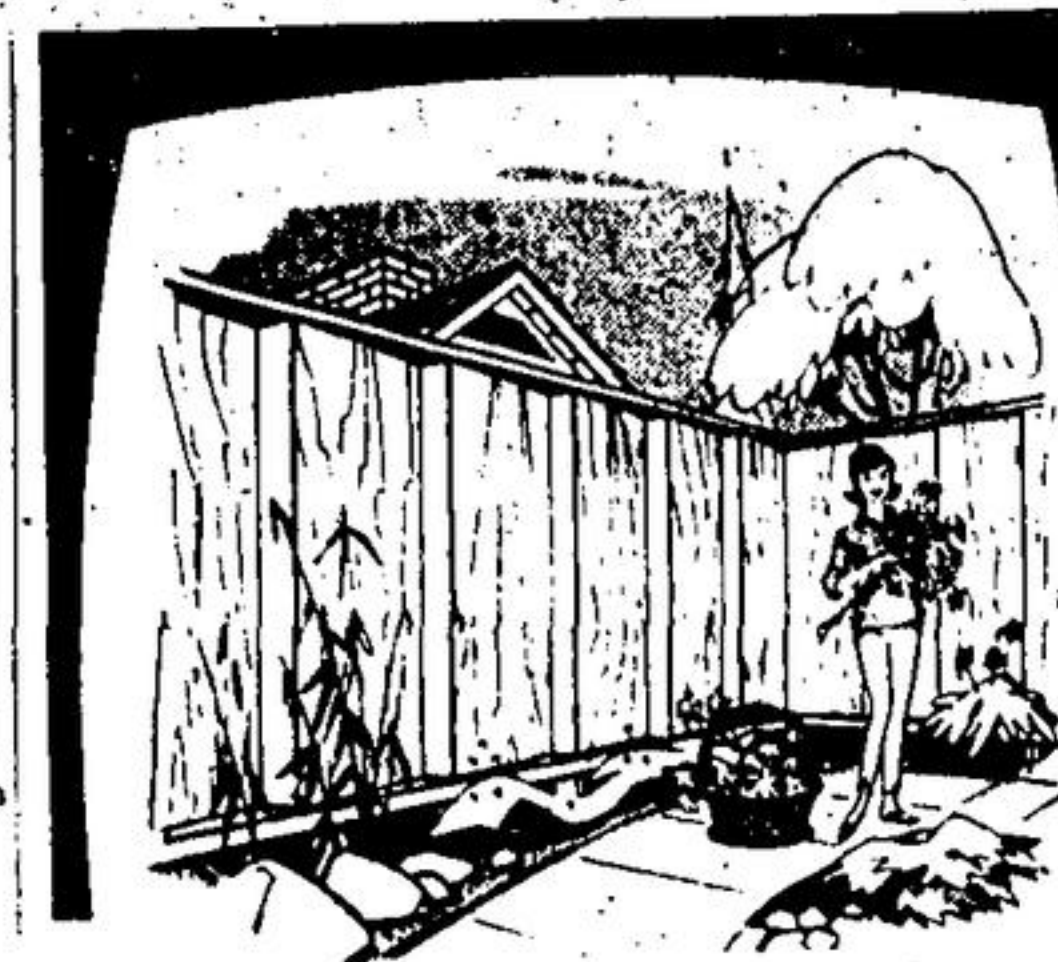

ONE OF A SERIES Build It Yourself



Fir plywood vertical step fence will ensure privacy

Here is how to have a solid end of template, fill in the wall of fence without that old dirt and damp. Again, use a fashioned blank look.

With this fir plywood vertical step fence you can have the privacy only a completely enclosed yard can give you. You can have it without the monotony and seam visual appeal of a straight, solid fence. Its construction is simple. Any handyman or amateur carpenter can build it easily. The materials are inexpensive, familiar and durable. 3/4" water proof glue for plywood, 1" x 8" and 1" x 6" lumber for rails and uprights, 2" x 6" redwood or cedar lumber for the posts.

Repeat this procedure, with all posts, using the template for spacing and getting the right angles. If you need a corner, cut the 1" x 8" base as shown in the detail drawing and use it to position the first post in the new direction.

When all posts are in you are ready to fasten on the 1" x 6" rails. You will notice that these do not parallel the edges of the posts since the rails are at an angle to the fence line. Nail them into the corner of the posts. They should be about 4" above redwood or cedar for the posts, ground. Use your level to get the rails exactly horizontal.

Now, using your original template for measurement, cut as many of the 1" x 8" base sections as required. Nail each to the top of the side rails between the posts.

Trim the posts to the correct height of exactly 8" above the base. The 1" x 8" cap for the first 6' section of 1" x 8" top of the fence is now nailed base. Remember the ends are to the posts. When fastening cut at an angle of 76 degrees, the cap to the posts make sure not 90 degrees. Use this section, the posts are the same distance as template to position the cap at the top as they are at angle and at exactly the right distance apart.

Before you dig the post hole, locate the fence line by stretching a string between two stakes.

Dig the first hole. They should be two feet deep and line the template up with the string allowing one end to overlap slightly the edge of the hole. Butt the post to the end of the template. Tamp remaining material to size and in the dirt while you hold the assembly in position. Use a spirit level to set the post vertical. Now dig the second hole at the end of the template. Now butt quality exterior type house end-butted to the installed post with a thick lead and oil paint.

The hope was expressed that the reunion in two years time would be record-breaking in attendance and in interest for all who look forward to these gatherings, especially as the next one will be the 20th anniversary of the Leslie Clan reunion.
