Overcrowding Faces Board Senior Students are Shifted

There will be no grade 8 class in Harrison Public School in September. At a meeting in the Harrison school last Wednesday the Georgetown Public School Board took the only step they could and agreed to transfer the Harrison Grade Eighters, approximately 41 pupils, to George Kennedy Public School on Weber Drive to temporarily remedy the worsening teaching space situation. The board was pushed into taking the step by enrollment figures which showed 90 new grade one pupils coming in and just 55 leaving at the other end of the already saturated school. Shifting the Harrison grade eighters to George Kennedy will leave that school close to capacity with 16 and possibly 17 classes. The board is seriously considering inserting another class at the grades 3-4 level in September at Kennedy. The Harrison grade eight pupils will go to their school just as they would normally, but will be transported from there to Kennedy by bus. All parents of the pupils to be shifted have received a form letter from the board explaining the move and the board has spoken to each year personally. The board anticipates that the shift will be in effect for the 1963-64 term only. By the
