WHAT DO YOU THINK?

An informal survey among smoke shops and drug stores shows that all the statistics linking cigarettes and lung cancer seem to be falling on deaf ears. No drop in cigarette sales is reported anywhere, but a slight increase in cigar and pipe sales in general.

Despite all the publicity about women pipe smokers only one pipe has been sold to a woman for her own use in town. She got the full course of instruction in filling and lighting. No one has reported if she can keep it lit, or if she consumes matches like most of the male pipe smokers.

The following comments were typical of those called.

THE DELEX SMOKE SHOP—No difference in cigarette sales, perhaps a slight increase in pipes and cigars. A few ladies have bought cigars, but only one bought a pipe.

HUTCH'S BILLIARDS and Snackette—No drop at all in cigarette sales, no marked increase or pipe sales. One woman inquired about a pipe, but that was all.

JOE'S TUCK SHOP—Selling just as many cigarettes. Some buy a pipe, smoke a few days, then go back to cigarettes. I've been asked for ladies' pipes and am going to get some. I think they need something to hold in their hand, as much as they need the smoke.

YOUNG'S DRUG STORE—No drop at all in cigarette sales, very little increase in cigar sales. No women have asked for pipes. Even the sale of pills to reduce the desire to smoke have not risen appreciably.
