## Tragic Death Rate Still Climbing

When the smoke had finally cleared from the recent Dominion Day motor accident picture for 1963, there was no cause for rejoicing among Canadians who should stand aghast at the "steady increase each year during these fatality-strewn 3 days. .

Dominion Automobile Association whose Statistical Research Department, maintains close touch with the national trend reports that July 1st week end 1963 had the dubious distinction, with a total of 81 traffice fatalities, of racking up the highest score in record for the period. Last year the total reached 55 deaths for the Dominion Day weekend.

The traffic faidlity breakdown Province-wise was as follows: Newfoundland, none; P.E.I., 3; Nova Scotia 3; New Brunswick 2; Quebec, 33; Ontario, 25; Manitoba. 4; Saskatchewan 1; Alberta 4; B.C., 6. And this is but the beginning! The vacation season which runs through September holds a

potential which is frightening to contemplate if the initial four days are any criterion. The vacation period in 1962 wound up with 1253 persons killed during the three months. . If the same rate of increaseestablished by the start-off, is maintained, a total at September-end could conceivably. 'amount to nearly 1900 traffic deaths for the three-month period. It's a grim, prospect which, however, is viewed with understandable apathy by the holiday-bound motorist who knows that accidents only . happens to the 'other fellow.'

Once it sinks in, that the driver of a motor car has at his fingertips an agency more lethal than dynamite, then there's a chance that a belated respect may gradually enter his attitude toward his gasoline-propelled missile. When that finally happens, we can hope for a significant decrease in the annual July-September peak in the motor fatality chart.

#### Recreation or Conservation?

In debating approval of the Credit Valley Authority's flood control scheme Chinquacousy's Reeve Cyril Clark took the apportunity to mention points about Conservation Authorities which bear watching; particularly proportion of money spent on recreation to that spent on conservation, and the road problem created by each Authority area.

The reeve is far from alone in his concern. And in fairness we should mention that the Authorities themselves are fully aware of the road-upkeep problem which conservatoin areas create. At present, as Reeve Clark mentioned, the townships are penalized for a road which carries mainly traffic from outside centres. Such roads are heavily travelled and need more attention than cost other roads in the township concerned. We understand attempts are being made to find solutions to the problem, but they are slow at coming.

Municipalities within watersheds have been showing less eagerness to contribute quickly to Authority schemes, partly because recreation has been the purpose, not

conservation. This, of course, is not true of the Credit Valley Authority flood control project. It is true conservation, and has found ready support. The recreation aspects are pleasurable byproducts

Water conservation, for instance, is of major importance in this part of the province. To achieve it, dams can be built, swamps protected, trees planted; and cerfainly such projects should receive an equal, if not greater, share of public funds collected by Conservation Authorities.
